TENTANG LAPORAN INI

Selain itu, laporan itu juga membentangkan penyata kewangan Yayasan Selangor yang telah diaudit.

Alhamdulillah, syukur ke hadrat Allah SWT, atas izin dan inayahNya dapat saya memberi sepatah dua kata di dalam Buku Laporan Tahunan 2020 Yayasan Selangor ini. Saya sebagai Dato' Menteri Besar Selangor, dan atas jawatan ini telah diamanahkan untuk menjadi Pengerusi Lembaga Pemegang Amanah Yayasan Selangor sejak Jun 2018 sepertimana yang termaktub di dalam Memorandum dan Artikel penubuhan Yayasan Selangor yang diluluskan oleh Suruhanjaya Syarikat Malaysia.

Sebagai Pengerusi Lembaga Pemegang Amanah Yayasan Selangor, selain mempengerusikan Mesyuarat, saya bersama ahli-ahli Lembaga Pemegang Amanah, bertanggung jawab untuk menentukan hal tuju dan memantau perjalanan operasi Yayasan Selangor agar sentiasa berada di landasan objektif yang betul serta mengamalkan tadbir urus yang baik.

Yayasan Selangor yang ditubuhkan sejak 50 tahun yang lalu dengan objektif untuk memberi bantuan dan galakan dalam bidang pendidikan kepada rakyat negeri Selangor akan terus fokus melaksanakan tugas dan tanggung jawabnya mengupaya insan, merealisasi wawasan.

PADA TAHUN 2020, USIA YAYASAN SELANGOR MENGINJAK KE ANGKA 50 TAHUN PADA 5 NOVEMBER 2020. DALAM USIA SEPARUH ABAD INI, SEHARUSNYA BANYAK PENGALAMAN DAN RENTETAN CATATAN SEJARAH YANG DICIPTA OLEH YAYASAN SELANGOR.



Sepanjang 50 tahun penubuhannya, pelbagai kejayaan telah diraih oleh Yayasan Selangor khasnya dalam usaha mengupaya insan melalui pendidikan. Ianya dapat dilihat dengan kejayaan para alumni Yayasan Selangor yang kini menerajui beberapa badan korporat, pakar perubatan, akauntan, jurutera, teknokrat dan sebagainya. Selain itu, Yayasan Selangor juga telah berjaya merintis penubuhan beberapa institusi pendidikan dan kemahiran di Selangor samada Kolej mahupun Universiti yang telah mengeluarkan ribuan tenaga mahir dan professional di negeri Selangor.

Pada tahun 2020, usia Yayasan Selangor menginjak ke angka 50 tahun pada 5 November 2020. Dalam usia separuh abad ini, seharusnya banyak pengalaman dan rentetan catatan sejarah yang dicipta oleh Yayasan Selangor. Dengan pengalaman dan reputasi seharusnya Yayasan Selangor cukup kuat untuk meneruskan usaha dan azamnya untuk terus mengupaya insan demi merealisasikan wawasan negeri dan negara.



NUKILAN PENA Pengerusi



Pada tahun 2021, Yayasan Selangor seharusnya melangkah dengan lebih yakin dan padu untuk meneruskan agendanya mengupanya insan dalam bidang pendidikan dengan memperkenalkan program-program baharu.

Tahun 2020 merupakan tahun yang sangat mencabar bukan sahaja kepada Yayasan Selangor, malahan kepada seluruh negeri, negara dan seluruh dunia akibat penularan pandemik Covid19. Apabila Perintah Kawalan Pergerakan (PKP) dikuatkuasakan mulai 18 Mac 2020 untuk menyekat penularan pandemik Covid19, banyak aktiviti pendidikan dan ekonomi tidak berjalan seperti biasa. Murid-murid sekolah tidak dapat belajar di sekolah dan ini boleh menjejaskan proses pendidikan mereka. Justeru itu, di dalam Pakej Rangsangan Selangor Prihatin (Fasa 2) melalui Yayasan Selangor kita telah memperkenalkan pembelajaran secara dalam talian atau 'e-learning' melalui portal Selangor Tutor yang diperkenalkan sejak April 2020. Dengan pelaksanaan 'e-learning'

melalui Selangor Tutor ini, murid-murid di Selangor yang tidak dapat bersekolah dan belajar secara bersemuka dengan guru, telah dapat meneruskan pembelajaran mereka dalam norma baharu Pendidikan. Hampir 100 ribu murid di Selangor telah menggunakan portal Selangor Tutor dan lebih 3 juta soalan dan 600 ribu latihan telah dijawab oleh murid-murid.

Yayasan Selangor yang beroperasi dengan menjana dana sendiri dan tidak mendapat apa-apa geran daripada kerajaan juga menghadapi cabaran ekonomi akibat pandemik ini. Walau bagaimanapun, kebajikan murid-murid tajaan dan juga warga kerja sentiasa menjadi keutamaan Yayasan Selangor. Dalam kegetiran ekonomi yang dihadapi, alhamdulillah, Yayasan Selangor dapat membiaya semua program dan bantuan pendidikan yang menjadi tanggung jawabnya dan terus mengekalkan kemudahan serta faedah kepada warga kerjanya.

Selain itu, sebagai sebuah korporat prihatin, Yayasan Selangor juga telah melaksanakan potongan kadar sewa dan penangguhan bayaran kepada para penyewa premis Yayasan Selangor khasnya di kalangan pengusaha IKS yang terjejas akibat pandemik. Yayasan Selangor juga memberi penangguhan bayaran balik pinjaman pelajaran kepada para peminjam yang terjejas.



Yayasan Selangor juga pada tahun 2020 telah banyak menyelesaikan isu-isu tadbir urusnya yang tertunggak, antaranya yang penting dan dapat diselesaikan adalah Penyata Kewangan Tahunan Beraudit Yayasan Selangor sejak tahun 2016 dan beberapa isu pendaftaran syarikat di Suruhanjaya Syarikat Malaysia yang telah berjaya disempurnakan mengikut peraturan dan undang-undang yang ditetapkan. Melalui reformasi dan transformasi tadbir urus korporat yang dilaksanakan oleh Pengurusan Yayasan Selangor yang baharu telah banyak membantu meletakkan Yayasan Selangor kembali ke landasan yang betul agar dapat melaksanakan lebih banyak bantuan dan program pendidikan di masa-masa akan datang.

Pada tahun 2021 dan tahun-tahun yang akan datang, dengan tadbir urus korporat yang telah ditambah baik, Yayasan Selangor seharusnya melangkah dengan lebih yakin dan padu untuk meneruskan agendanya mengupanya insan dalam bidang pendidikan dengan memperkenalkan program-program baharu. Kejayaan 50 tahun yang lalu seharusnya dilonjakkan dengan lebih baik lagi pada 50 tahun atau 100 tahun ke hadapan. Saya difahamkan bahawa pihak Pengurusan Yayasan Selangor sedang menjalinkan rundingan untuk mengadakan kerjasama pendidikan dengan beberapa agensi kerajaan dan swasta yang akan memberi nilai tambah kepada program pendidikan sedia ada, dan ini adalah suatu usaha yang amat baik dalam Yayasan Selangor meraikan sambutan ulangtahun ke-50 nya pada tahun

2020 ini. Oleh kerana kekangan pandemik pada tahun 2020, kerjasama pendidikan ini akan diperkemas dan dimeterai pada tahun 2021 sebagai suatu agenda penting Yayasan Selangor yang akan datang.

Pada tahun akan datang, sebagai Pengerusi, saya ingin melihat usaha-usaha penambah baik dalam bidang pendidikan dan tadbir urus Yayasan Selangor akan terus diperkasakan. Yayasan Selangor sebagai salah sebuah agensi Kerajaan Negeri Selangor yang terpenting khasnya dalam menyediakan modal insan yang berkeupayaan untuk mengisi pembangunan negeri dan negara di masa hadapan perlulah sentiasa siap siaga menghadapi apa jua cabaran yang mendatang.

Saya menyeru kepada semua warga kerja Yayasan Selangor agar terus membulatkan tekad, mengamalkan tadbir urus korporat yang baik, berintegriti tinggi dalam melaksanakan tugas dan tanggung jawab, sentiasa fokus dengan objektif yang ditetapkan dan akhirnya bersama-sama Kerajaan Negeri Selangor dalam wawasan Selangor Negeri Maju Pintar Serantau 2025.

Semenjak saya memegang tampuk kepimpinan sebagai Ketua Pegawai Eksekutif Yayasan Selangor dua tahun yang lalu, pelbagai peristiwa penting telah berlaku.

Beberapa pembaharuan dasar dan penambahbaikan polisi telah diperkenalkan. Antaranya adalah pengamalan tadbir urus korporat yang baik seperti yang digariskan dalam Pelan Tindakan Strategik Yayasan Selangor yang diperkenalkan. Melalui pembaharuan dasar ini, Yayasan Selangor kekal komited untuk menyediakan pembiayaan yang mencukupi untuk membiayai program-program pendidikan yang merupakan objektif dan fokus utamanya.

Lembaga Pemegang Amanah Yayasan Selangor telah meluluskan Pelan Tindakan Strategik ini pada 19 Disember 2019 dan mula dilaksanakan pada tahun 2020. Ia disasarkan untuk meningkatkan pencapaian dan imej organisasi.

Pelan tindakan yang dirangka untuk menjadikan Yayasan Selangor lebih baik melalui penambahbaikan beberapa aspek tertentu. Aspek pertama dalam pelan tindakan itu adalah untuk menstruktur semula organisasi terma rujukannya. Kedua, ia juga akan mengkaji untuk menambah baik prosedur kendalian standard (SOP), tadbir urus korporat, pengurusan risiko, dan pelan luar jangka. Akhir sekali, kami akan berusaha untuk meningkatkan kecekapan operasi pengurusan dan memastikan kemampunan kewangan.

Memandangkan Yayasan Selangor genap 50 tahun pada tahun ini, kami terus komited dengan misi kami untuk mewujudkan infrastruktur pendidikan yang cemerlang, yang akan melahirkan generasi masa depan yang ideal dan menyeluruh. Objektif "Menjana Dana, Mengenalpasti Kumpulan Sasaran, dan Membiayai Pendidikan Untuk Semua" menjadi tunjang menyokong usaha ini.

PROGRAM PENDIDIKAN YANG MEMATUHI NORMA BAHARU BOLEH DILAKSANAKAN, TERUTAMANYA DALAM SITUASI PANDEMIK YANG BERTERUSAN.

Yayasan Selangor, sebagai sebuah organisasi bukan berasaskan keuntungan yang menjana pendapatan sendiri dan tidak bergantung kepada geran kerajaan, mesti mengamalkan tadbir urus korporat yang baik, mengurus asetnya dengan berkesan dan berintegriti. Matlamat utama Yayasan Selangor adalah untuk menyediakan perkhidmatan pendidikan yang unggul kepada rakyat Selangor.

Tahun 2020 dilalui dengan penuh cabaran bukan sahaja untuk Yayasan Selangor, malahan kebanyakan organisasi di Malaysia dan seluruh dunia. Perkhidmatan Yayasan Selangor turut terjejas akibat pandemik global, COVID-19. Pelbagai inisiatif pendidikan yang dirancang tidak dapat dilaksanakan berikutan penularan wabak dan pelaksanaan Perintah Kawalan Pergerakan (PKP) pada tahun 2020. Walau bagaimanapun, semasa pandemik, keselamatan dan kesihatan pelajar serta warga kerja menjadi penekanan utama operasi Yayasan Selangor.

Banyak aktiviti tergendala akibat sekatan pergerakan. Sebaliknya, Yayasan Selangor menggunakan ini sebagai peluang untuk bermuhasabah dan memperkukuhkan tadbir urusnya. Yayasan Selangor pada tahun 2020 telah berjaya menyelesaikan isu-isu tertunggak berkaitan ketidakpatuhan tadbir urus korporat yang berlarutan sejak beberapa tahun sebelumnya. Antara pencapaian utama adalah penyediaan Penyata Kewangan Beraudit dari 2016 hingga 2019 yang diluluskan pada Mesyuarat Agung Tahunan, diikuti dengan pematuhan kepada undang-undang dan peraturan yang digariskan oleh Lembaga Hasil Dalam Negeri (LHDN) dan Suruhanjaya Syarikat Malaysia (SSM). Tahun 2020 merupakan tahun untuk Yayasan Selangor melaksanakan pembersihan dalaman dan 'reset' organisasi sebelum melakukan transformasi untuk menjadi Yayasan yang lebih mampan.

Di samping itu, program pendidikan yang mematuhi norma baharu boleh dilaksanakan, terutamanya dalam situasi pandemik yang berterusan.

Yayasan Selangor terus berfungsi dalam norma baharu, memandangkan beberapa pembaharuan operasi dan tadbir urus korporat sedang dibuat mengikut Pelan Tindakan Strategik.

Seterusnya, memandangkan pendidikan merupakan aktiviti teras utama Yayasan Selangor, pelbagai inisiatif baharu telah diperkenalkan dan sedang dilaksanakan. Beberapa kerjasama pendidikan telah dirancang dan dirundingkan dengan pelbagai agensi awam, swasta dan pertubuhan bukan kerajaan bagi meningkatkan lagi potensi dan kemahiran pelajar tajaan Yayasan Selangor demi meningkatkan mutu dan pencapaian pelajar serta perkhidmatan pendidikan yang disediakan oleh Yayasan Selangor.

Yayasan Selangor, dengan kerjasama Kerajaan Negeri Selangor, telah membangunkan program e-pembelajaran Selangor Tutor, yang boleh digunakan oleh pelajar yang tidak dapat menghadiri kelas bersemuka akibat penutupan sekolah kerana pandemik.

Kerjasama pendidikan telah dirundingkan dengan pelbagai organisasi antaranya Kementerian Pendidikan Malaysia, Jabatan Pendidikan Negeri Selangor, Majlis Amanah Rakyat (MARA), Yayasan Peneraju Pendidikan Bumiputera, Yayasan Raja Muda Selangor, Perbadanan Perpustakaan Awam Selangor (PPAS), UNISEL, KUIS dan beberapa agensi lain, yang akan menjadi titik permulaan kepada reformasi program pendidikan Yayasan Selangor selaras dengan kemajuan teknologi IR4.0.

Menutup tahun 2020, terdapat beberapa perkara penting yang harus kita teliti. Isu ekonomi dan mengamalkan tadbir urus korporat yang berkesan, adalah masalah yang pada pendapat saya, harus diberi penekanan dan perhatian yang lebih pada tahun hadapan. Untuk menawarkan pulangan optimum kepada Yayasan Selangor, kita harus memperkemaskan lagi pengurusan aset hartanah. Selain itu, pengaktifan semula Tabung Pendidikan Yayasan Selangor boleh membantu dalam pembiayaan program pendidikan melalui sokongan dan kerjasama rakan strategik, khususnya dalam kalangan syarikat korporat di Selangor.

Dengan pengenalan idea-idea baharu, saya pasti Yayasan Selangor akan terus dapat menawarkan bantuan pendidikan. Usaha berterusan untuk menyusun dan menjadi lebih sistematik akan membantu Yayasan Selangor mencapai matlamatnya dan menjadi peneraju utama dalam menyediakan perkhidmatan pendidikan yang berkualiti.



Saya beriltizam agar Yayasan Selangor akan terus mengorak langkah ke hadapan dan terus memperkasakan sektor pendidikan demi melahirkan generasi individu yang berkualiti khususnya di Selangor dan Malaysia amnya. Yayasan Selangor akan terus bergerak memberikan perkhidmatan pendidikan yang unggul, mengupaya insan demi merealisasikan wawasan.

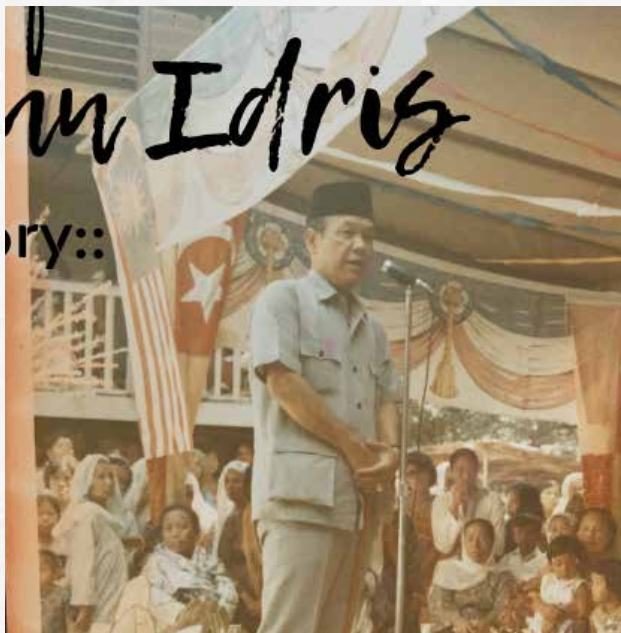


PENGASAS YAYASAN SELANGOR



Allahyarham Dato' Seri Harun Idris, Menteri Besar Selangor yang kelapan merupakan pengasas dan pengerusi pertama Yayasan Selangor.

Beliau seorang pemimpin yang berpandangan jauh dan mempunyai kesedaran yang tinggi tentang kepentingan ilmu. Menurut beliau, ilmu akan membantu membebaskan masyarakat daripada belenggu kesusahan dan kemiskinan. Hasil kesedaran inilah tertubuhnya Yayasan Selangor yang telah didaftarkan secara rasmi di bawah Akta Syarikat 1965 sebagai sebuah syarikat berhad menurut jaminan pada 5 November 1970.



1970

PENUBUHAN YAYASAN SELANGOR

Kepentingan pendidikan kepada generasi akan datang amatlah kritikal khususnya untuk merapatkan jurang pendidikan antara penduduk luar bandar dengan penduduk bandar. Pelajar luar bandar patut diberi peluang untuk belajar di sekolah dengan fasiliti terbaik di bandar yang sebelum ini hanya dinikmati penduduk di bandar dan elit. Fokus Dato' Seri Harun Idris pada tahun-tahun awal penubuhan Yayasan Selangor adalah untuk mengurangkan jurang ini dan melahirkan pelajar yang berpendidikan menyeluruh dengan penekanan diberikan kepada mata pelajaran Sains dan Matematik.

Berkat usaha gigih Dato' Seri Harun Idris, pada 27 Mei 1971, Yayasan Selangor telah berjaya membuka rasmi Asrama Dr. Latiff yang menempatkan pelajar dari seluruh Selangor. Asrama itu dinamakan sempena nama Dr Latiff, iaitu doktor perubatan moden Melayu yang pertama. Nama tokoh ini adalah pilihan tepat selaras matlamat untuk melahirkan dan menyediakan pelajar Yayasan Selangor dengan latar belakang yang kukuh dalam bidang Sains dan Matematik.

SEJARAH YAYASAN SELANGOR

1971

ASRAMA DR LATIFF, JALAN GURNEY, KUALA LUMPUR

Asrama ini mula dibina pada awal tahun 1970an di Persiaran Gurney, Kuala Lumpur, dan merupakan asrama terulung Yayasan Selangor. Asrama ini dinamakan sempena nama seorang doktor perubatan moden Melayu pertama, Tan Sri Dato' Dr. Abdul Latiff bin Abdul Razak yang berasal dari Pasir Penambang, Kuala Selangor. Nama Dr Latiff dipilih untuk memberi inspirasi kepada pelajar untuk bekerja keras dan bersungguh-sungguh untuk mencapai impian mereka dan mencapai kejayaan.



Asrama Dr Latiff telah dibuka secara rasmi oleh Allahyarham Dato' Harun Idris pada 27 Mei 1971 dan menempatkan pelajar sekolah Victoria Institution, St. John's Institution dan Methodist Boys' School, Kuala Lumpur.

1975

PENEMPATAN PELAJAR DI ASRAMA TUN DR ISMAIL & ASRAMA TOH PUAN NORASHIKIN, KG. PANDAN, KUALA LUMPUR

Asrama Tun Dr Ismail dan Asrama Toh Puan Norashikin mula dibina pada tahun 1973 dan siap pada tahun 1975. Asrama yang dinamakan sempena nama Timbalan Perdana Menteri Malaysia Kedua dan isterinya ini masing-masing terletak di Jalan Nakhoda Yusof dan di Jalan Jarret yang berdekatan.

Pengambilan murid ke dua-dua asrama ini telah memberi lebih peluang kepada anak-anak Selangor mendapatkan pendidikan lebih baik di sekolah terbaik di Kuala Lumpur dan Petaling Jaya.



Murid-murid yang tinggal di asrama ini bersekolah di sekolah terpilih seperti SMK Victoria, SMK St. John, SMK (L) Methodist, SMK Convent Bukit Nenas, SMK Aminudin Baki, SMK Jln Cochrane di Kuala Lumpur, SMK (P) Sri Aman, SMK (P) Assunta, SMK (L) Bukit Bintang dan SMK La Salle di Petaling Jaya.



1984

PEMBIAYAAN PENDIDIKAN PELAJAR INSTITUSI PENGAJIAN TINGGI

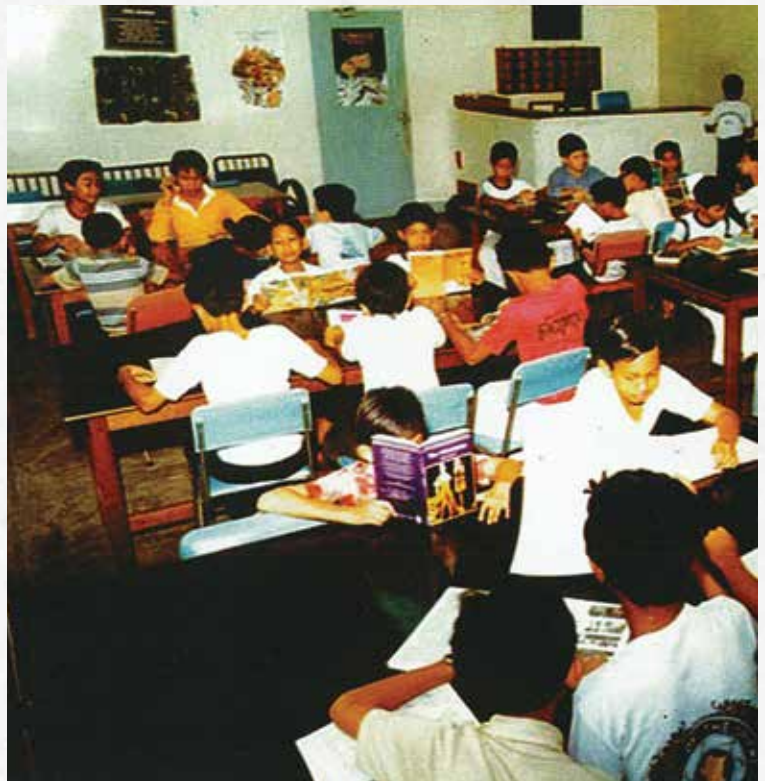
Dalam usaha memperkasakan perkhidmatannya, pada tahun 1984, Yayasan Selangor mula membiayai pelajar tajaan yang meneruskan pengajian di institusi pengajian tinggi awam (IPTA). Yayasan Selangor pada ketika itu bukan sahaja memberi kemudahan asrama kepada pelajar-pelajar tajaan Yayasan Selangor dibawah Program Rancangan Khas Pendidikan Kementerian Pendidikan Malaysia dan Yayasan Selangor, malahan turut memberi Biasiswa dan selanjutnya menyediakan kemudahan pembiayaan kepada pelajar-pelajar yang melanjutkan pengajian ke institut pengajian tinggi.



1986

Program HIPERS (High Performance Rural School) telah mula diperkenalkan pada tahun 1986. Program HIPERS telah dilaksanakan di 10 buah sekolah rendah di Negeri Selangor. Objektif utama program itu diadakan adalah untuk meningkatkan pencapaian murid luar bandar dalam Ujian Penilaian Sekolah Rendah (UPSR). Program ini berjaya melonjakkan pencapaian pelajar dan sekolah serta meningkatkan prestasi pelajar luar bandar yang menduduki UPSR.

1988

PENEMPATAN PELAJAR DI ASRAMA YS KLANG DAN ASRAMA DAERAH (SMDH, SMKTD, SMKSAAS, SMKKKB) – RKPYS

Sebelum pembukaan asrama pelajar Asrama Yayasan Selangor Klang (AYSK), Yayasan Selangor telah menempatkan pelajarannya di dua buah sekolah di daerah Klang iaitu di SMK Tengku Ampuan Rahimah dan SMK Tinggi Klang. Pada tahun 1988, Yayasan Selangor mula menempatkan pelajar Tingkatan 1 di Asrama Yayasan Selangor Klang (AYSK), di samping memindahkan pelajar tajaan Yayasan yang sebelum ini ditempatkan di SMK Tengku Ampuan Rahimah dan SMK Tinggi Klang ke asrama ini.



Pada tahun 1988 juga, Yayasan Selangor mula menempatkan pelajar tajaannya di empat buah sekolah berasrama iaitu Sekolah Menengah Dato' Harun (Tanjung Karang), Sekolah Menengah Telok Datok, Sekolah Menengah Sultan Abdul Aziz Shah (Kajang) dan Sekolah Menengah Kuala Kubu Bharu. Sekolah-sekolah ini dikategorikan sebagai asrama daerah.

Pelajar di AYSK juga ditempatkan di pelbagai sekolah di Klang, iaitu SMK Tinggi Klang, SMK La Salle, SMK Methodist dan SMK Convent. Penempatan pelajar di sekolah-sekolah ini dilakukan dengan tujuan meningkatkan penguasaan Bahasa Inggeris pelajar tajaan Yayasan Selangor. Kemudahan yang disediakan di AYSK ialah dua blok asrama untuk pelajar lelaki dan perempuan, dewan makan, surau, dewan, makmal sains, kelas persediaan dan kemudahan sukan seperti gelanggang skuasy, gelanggang badminton dan gelanggang bola jaring. Yayasan Selangor juga turut menyediakan bas dan van sebagai kemudahan pengangkutan untuk membawa pelajar ke sekolah. Asrama ini dapat memuatkan sehingga 350 orang pelajar.



1992

YAYASAN SELANGOR MENGAMBIL ALIH PENGURUSAN KEM BINA SEMANGAT DI KUALA KUBU BHARU

Yayasan Selangor seterusnya mengembangkan lagi program pendidikan yang menekankan pembangunan sahsiah insan dengan mengambil alih pengurusan Kem Bina Semangat di Ampang Pecah, Kuala Kubu Bharu, daripada Kerajaan Negeri Selangor.

Kem yang terletak 65 km dari Kuala Lumpur ini sangat sesuai untuk aktiviti latihan kerana terletak dalam persekitaran yang aman dan indah di tebing Sungai Selangor dalam kawasan berbukit-bukau yang menghijau





1993

PENUBUHAN KOLEJ INPENS

Yayasan Selangor meneruskan usaha untuk memenuhi visinya dalam bidang pendidikan melalui penubuhan Kolej INPENS, dengan tujuan melahirkan tenaga kerja yang berkemahiran tinggi dan celik teknologi.

Kolej INPENS yang menawarkan program kemahiran selaras dengan perkembangan teknologi IR4.0 telah berjaya menempatkan kedudukannya sebagai antara institusi latihan kemahiran terunggul di Negeri Selangor dan kini beroperasi di Kuala Selangor.



1994

PENEMPATAN PELAJAR DI ASRAMA YS SABAK BERNAM

Asrama Yayasan Selangor Sabak Bernam (AYSSB) telah mula beroperasi pada tahun 1994 dan dirasmikan pada Majlis Sambutan Jubli Perak Yayasan Selangor pada tahun 1995.

Asrama ini mula beroperasi dengan kapasiti 100 orang pelajar dan menempatkan hanya pelajar putera SMK Ungku Aziz dan SMK Tunku Abdul Rahman yang kedua-duanya terletak di daerah Sabak Bernam.



1995

PENGAMBILAN PELAJAR DI ASRAMA DAERAH SMKDU – RKPYS

Pada tahun 1995, Yayasan Selangor meningkatkan lagi pengambilan pelajar di Asrama Daerah melalui penempatan pelajar di Sekolah Menengah Kebangsaan Damansara Utama menerusi Rancangan Khas Pendidikan Yayasan Selangor.

PROGRAM PEKA 21 (KECEMERLANGAN ABAD KE-21) - 50 BUAH SEKOLAH DI SELANGOR

Program PEKA 21 merupakan transformasi penambah baikan program HIPERS yang diadakan sebelum tahun 1998. Program PEKA 21 dilancarkan bagi meningkatkan lagi kecemerlangan akademik pelajar dan seterusnya meluaskan skop program tersebut ke 50 buah sekolah di negeri Selangor.

1999

PENUBUHAN PUSAT LATIHAN KEMAHIRAN YS (PLKYS) DI KUALA SELANGOR

Pusat Latihan Kemahiran ini telah melahirkan belia-belia berkemahiran yang mampu memberikan perkhidmatan juruelektik kompeten di seluruh negara.

Kursus sepenuh masa yang ditawarkan di institut ini ialah Kursus Pendawaian Elektrik Satu Fasa (PW2) dan Kursus Teknologi Penyejukan dan Penyamanan Udara, manakala Kursus Pendawaian Tiga Fasa (PW4) dilaksanakan secara separuh masa.

6 SEKOLAH AGAMA BANTUAN KERAJAAN SERTA RANCANGAN KHAS PENDIDIKAN YAYASAN SELANGOR (RKPYS)

Rancangan Khas Pendidikan Yayasan Selangor (RKPYS) merupakan program utama pendidikan Yayasan Selangor.

Pada tahun 2008, Yayasan Selangor meningkatkan penglibatannya melalui peluasan RKPYS kepada enam lagi sekolah agama bantuan kerajaan (SABK) yang dimasukkan di bawah program ini.

MAAHAD TAHFIZ SAINS & TEKNOLOGI JAIS SERTA RANCANGAN KHAS PENDIDIKAN YAYASAN SELANGOR (RKPYS)

Program Rancangan Khas Pendidikan Yayasan Selangor menambahkan lagi bilangan pelajar tajaannya dengan penyertaan Maahad Tahfiz Sains & Teknologi di bawah kelolaan JAIS.

Selain pengajian akademik, Yayasan Selangor turut mengutamakan ilmu agama dalam kalangan pelajarannya.



2014

PELANCARAN SEMULA PROGRAM HIPERS

Program HIPERS dilancarkan semula untuk membantu lebih ramai pelajar di Selangor dari segi pendidikan pada tahun 2014. Program ini dilaksanakan di 10 buah sekolah rendah dan 10 buah sekolah menengah di Negeri Selangor.



Para peserta terdiri daripada murid Tahun 6 dan Tingkatan 5. Objektif program ini adalah untuk melonjakkan pencapaian murid luar bandar/pinggir bandar yang berpotensi supaya dapat melanjutkan pelajaran ke sekolah terpilih seperti SBP, MRSM dan sekolah kluster (bagi lepasan UPSR) dan seterusnya melanjutkan pelajaran ke institusi pengajian tinggi dan atau pusat kemahiran tinggi selepas menduduki peperiksaan SPM.

Program ini memberikan impak positif kepada pelajar dan sekolah khususnya dari segi peningkatan 'band' serta disokong oleh JPN Selangor. Bilangan pelajar dijangka akan bertambah setiap tahun untuk memberikan peluang kepada lebih ramai lagi pelajar.

2017

TUITION ONLINE – TUISYEN DALAM TALIAN PERCUMA

Program tuisyen dalam talian percuma "Tuition Online" merupakan produk pendidikan yang mula diperkenalkan atas inisiatif bersama dengan Kerajaan Negeri Selangor bagi memastikan peningkatan taraf pendidikan di negeri Selangor. Yayasan Selangor dilantik sebagai agensi pelaksana untuk menguruskan program ini bersama-sama Kerajaan Negeri.

Selain video pembelajaran berasaskan topik bagi setiap mata pelajaran, aplikasi ini turut menawarkan soalan latihan berasaskan topik untuk meningkatkan lagi kefahaman pelajar.



Pelajar boleh mengikuti pelajaran dengan mudah di mana-mana sahaja, pada bila-bila masa, melalui telefon pintar atau apa-apa peranti lain.

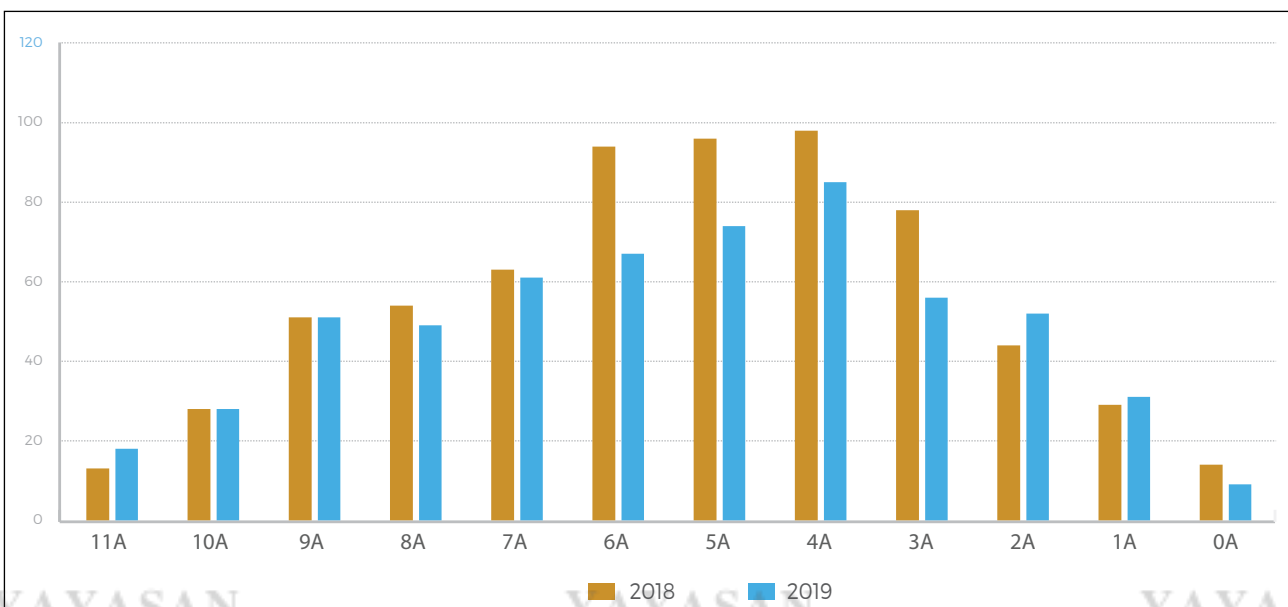
Dari 18 Mac 2020 hingga Julai 2020 dan 9 September hingga 31 Disember 2020, semua sekolah di seluruh negara telah ditutup akibat pandemik COVID-19. Oleh itu, sesi pengajaran dan pembelajaran tidak dapat dijalankan secara bersemuka dan hanya diadakan secara maya. Sekolah juga tidak dapat mengadakan peperiksaan seperti peperiksaan pertengahan tahun dan akhir tahun pada tahun 2020. Oleh itu, pencapaian pelajar Tingkatan 1 hingga Tingkatan 5 tidak dapat diukur berdasarkan keputusan peperiksaan seperti yang dilakukan sebelum ini. Hal ini secara langsung memberi kesan pada KPI asrama Yayasan Selangor, iaitu KPI asrama tidak dapat dicapai.

Pandemik COVID-19 yang sering dikenal sebagai pandemik coronavirus ialah wabak penyakit yang melanda seluruh dunia dan berpunca daripada virus yang diberi nama SARS-CoV-2. Penyakit ini pertama kali ditemui pada pertengahan Disember 2019 di Wuhan, Hubei, China, dan diisytiharkan sebagai pandemik oleh Pertubuhan Kesihatan Sedunia (WHO) pada 11 Mac 2020. Sehingga kini, pandemik ini telah meragut nyawa berjuta-juta orang di seluruh dunia.



Virus COVID-19 menular dan menyebarkan dengan cara yang sama seperti penularan influenza, iaitu melalui titisan pernafasan ketika seseorang itu batuk atau bersin. Virus ini menyerang sistem tubuh manusia seawal lima hari atau selewat-lewatnya 14 hari selepas jangkitan. Gejala biasa yang akan dihadapi adalah termasuk demam, batuk dan sesak nafas. Komplikasi yang lebih serius ialah radang paru-paru dan gangguan pernafasan yang akut. Langkah-langkah pencegahan yang disyorkan oleh Kementerian Kesihatan Malaysia termasuk mencuci tangan, menutup mulut ketika batuk, menjaga jarak yang selamat antara individu (terutamanya bagi individu yang tidak sihat), dan pemantauan serta pengasingan selama 14 hari bagi individu yang disyaki terjangkit.

PENCEGAHAN PENULARAN

Kerajaan Malaysia mengumumkan pelaksanaan Perintah Kawalan Pergerakan (PKP) di seluruh negara pada 18 Mac 2020 dan semua aktiviti ekonomi dihentikan pada waktu itu. Langkah ini diambil untuk menyekat penyebaran penyakit COVID-19. Sehingga kini, masyarakat umum harus menyesuaikan diri dengan menerapkan norma hidup baharu.

Berikutan penyebaran COVID-19 di seluruh negara khususnya di Lembah Klang, Yayasan Selangor telah melaksanakan beberapa teknik pencegahan yang menyeluruh termasuk di pejabat dan asrama pusat Yayasan Selangor. Langkah proaktif yang diambil termasuk menyebarkan maklumat mengenai pandemik COVID-19 dalam bentuk pelbagai jenis infografik kepada semua pekerja. Pengurusan Yayasan Selangor juga telah memberikan pelitup muka dan cecair pensanitasi tangan kepada semua pekerja untuk mencegah penyebaran penyakit di kalangan kakitangan.

Selanjutnya, Yayasan Selangor telah menubuhkan Pasukan Tindakan Kecemasan Yayasan Selangor (ERT YS) yang bertanggungjawab untuk merancang atau melaksanakan strategi pencegahan COVID-19 di Yayasan Selangor, iaitu seperti menguruskan proses pembersihan di pejabat dan asrama pusat Yayasan Selangor. Setiap perancangan yang diatur oleh pasukan ERT YS ini adalah berpandukan kepada ketetapan SOP dari Kementerian Kesihatan Malaysia (KKM) dan Kementerian Pendidikan Malaysia (KPM) yang melibatkan garis panduan pembukaan sekolah di dalam norma baharu.

Various accomplishments have been achieved by Yayasan Selangor during its 50-year history, particularly in its efforts to assist the people via education. This is evident from the success of Yayasan Selangor graduates who presently run major corporate entities, or who are now physicians, accountants, engineers, technocrats, and so on. Aside from that, Yayasan Selangor has successfully pioneered the creation of numerous educational and skills institutions in Selangor, such as colleges and universities, that have generated thousands of trained and professional employees in Selangor.

On 5 November 2020, Yayasan Selangor will be 50 years old. Yayasan Selangor has countless experience and accomplished a string of historical achievements, based on its half century record. Yayasan Selangor's expertise and reputation should enable it to sustain its efforts and its resolve to empower people in order to fulfil the goals of the state and the country.

Yayasan Selangor will move forward with more confidence and cohesiveness in 2021 and beyond in order to carry on with its objective of empowering people in the field of education by launching new initiatives.

Due to the spread of the Covid-19 pandemic, the year 2020 was extremely difficult, not just for Yayasan Selangor but also for the entire state, the country, and the whole world. Many educational and economic activities were disrupted when the Movement Control Order (PKP) went into effect on 18 March 2020 to combat the spread of Covid-19. Schoolchildren were unable to go to school, which may have impacted their educational progress. As a result, under the Selangor Prihatin Stimulus Package (Phase 2) offered by Yayasan Selangor, we have included online learning, or e-learning, via the Selangor Tutor

portal, which was launched in April 2020. Students in Selangor who are unable to attend school and to attend face-to-face classes with their teachers have been allowed to continue their learning in the new norm due partly to the adoption of e-learning through Selangor Tutor. Almost 100,000 students in Selangor have utilized the Selangor Tutor service, and students have answered over 3 million questions and fulfilled 600,000 exercises.

Yayasan Selangor, which operates entirely on its own financing and receives no government subsidies, is currently suffering financial difficulties as a result of the pandemic. The well-being of sponsored students and employees, on the other hand, has always been a top priority for Yayasan Selangor. Despite the economic difficulties, Yayasan Selangor is able to support all programmes and educational aid that fall under its purview, as well as continuing to provide facilities and perks to its employees.

Apart from that, Yayasan Selangor, as a caring corporation, has introduced rental rate reductions and payment deferral for tenants of Yayasan Selangor facilities, particularly among SME businesses impacted by the pandemic. Yayasan Selangor also allows the deferment of education-loan repayment for affected borrowers.



Yayasan Selangor also resolved many outstanding governance issues in 2020, among which are the Audited Annual Financial Statements of Yayasan Selangor since 2016 and several issues of company registration in Malaysia, which have been successfully completed in accordance with the applicable rules and regulations. The current management's changes and transformations in terms of corporate governance have greatly aided in putting Yayasan Selangor back on track to be able to provide more assistance and carry out more educational initiatives in the future.

With a more solid corporate governance, Yayasan Selangor will move forward with more confidence and cohesiveness in 2021 and beyond in order to carry on with its objective of empowering people in the field of education by launching new initiatives. The success of the last 50 years should be repeated over the coming 50 or even 100 years. I have been informed that the management of Yayasan Selangor is in negotiations with various government and commercial entities for educational collaboration that would add value to current education programmes. This is a very commendable effort as Yayasan Selangor celebrates its fiftieth anniversary in 2020. Because of the restrictions due to the pandemic in 2020, such educational collaboration will be streamlined and agreed upon in 2021 as a future key agenda item for Yayasan Selangor.

As Chairman, I would like to see Yayasan Selangor's development efforts in education and governance continue to be reinforced in the next year. Yayasan Selangor, being one of the most significant agencies of the Selangor State Government, particularly in terms of generating human capital capable of fulfilling the state's and the country's future growth needs, must constantly be prepared to tackle any problems that may arise.

MESSAGE FROM THE YAYASAN SELANGOR CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER

It has been an eventful past two years since I have taken the helm as Chief Executive Officer of Yayasan Selangor.

In this past year at Yayasan Selangor, several policy adjustments and improvements were introduced. Among these, the primary component addressed through the Strategic Action Plan has been the implementation of excellent corporate governance procedures. Through these new policy adjustments, the Management of Yayasan Selangor is dedicated to providing sufficient funding for educational programmes, which are the organization's major goals and its main emphasis.

Yayasan Selangor's Board of Trustees adopted the YS Strategic Action Plan, which is expected to improve the organization's strength and image, on 19 December 2019 to guarantee that objectives were met for execution beginning in 2020.

The action plan looks into bettering Yayasan Selangor by improving certain aspects of the foundation. The action plan will seek, firstly, to restructure the Terms of Reference and organizational structure. Secondly, it will also look into improving SOPs, corporate governance, risk management, and contingency plans. Finally, we would seek to increase the efficiency of management operations and ensure long-term financial viability.

As Yayasan Selangor turns 50 years old this year, we remain committed to our mission to create an excellent educational infrastructure that will produce ideal, well-rounded future generations. The objective of "Generating Funds, Identifying Target Groups, and Funding Education For All" underpins this effort.

EDUCATION PROGRAMMES IN COMPLIANCE WITH THE NEW NORMS COULD BE EXECUTED, PARTICULARLY IN THE ONGOING PANDEMIC SITUATION.

Yayasan Selangor, as a non-profit organization that generates its own revenue rather than relying on government grants, must follow sound corporate governance practices and manage its assets effectively and with integrity. The major goal of Yayasan Selangor will always be to provide premium education services to the people of Selangor.

However, 2020 was filled with challenges not just for Yayasan Selangor, but also for all organizations in Malaysia and throughout the world. Yayasan Selangor's services were also impacted by the global Covid-19 pandemic. Many of the planned education initiatives could not be implemented owing to the pandemic and the adoption of the Movement Control Order (PKP) in 2020. During the pandemic, however, the safety and health of students and employees was the primary emphasis of Yayasan Selangor's operational management.

Many activities were hampered as a result of movement restrictions. Instead, Yayasan Selangor made use of this as an opportunity to reflect on and strengthen its governance. Yayasan Selangor effectively simplified its organization in 2020 by resolving lingering difficulties and non-compliance issues that had cropped up over previous years. Among the key accomplishments is the completion of the Audited Financial Statements from 2016 to 2019 and their approval at the Annual General Meeting, followed by compliance with the criteria and norms imposed by the Inland Revenue Board (IRB) and the Companies Commission of Malaysia (SSM). 2020 was the year for Yayasan Selangor to carry out in-house cleaning and 'reset' the organization before making the transformation to becoming a more sustainable foundation.

In addition, education programmes in compliance with the new norms could be executed, particularly in the ongoing pandemic situation.

Yayasan Selangor continues to function within the new rules, since a number of operational and corporate governance reforms are being made in accordance with the Strategic Action Plan.

Furthermore, as education is the Yayasan Selangor's major core activity, numerous new initiatives have been created and are being implemented. Several education collaborations have been planned and negotiated with various public, private, and non-governmental organizations to further enhance the potential and skills of students sponsored by Yayasan Selangor in order to improve the quality and achievement of students and Education services provided by Yayasan Selangor.

Yayasan Selangor, in conjunction with the Selangor State Government, has developed the Selangor Tutor e-learning programme, which may be utilized by students who are unable to attend face-to-face classes owing to school closures caused by the pandemic.

Education Cooperation has been negotiated with various organizations, which include the Ministry of Education Malaysia, Selangor State Education Department, Majlis Amanah Rakyat (MARA), Yayasan Peneraju Pendidikan Bumiputera, Yayasan Raja Muda Selangor, Perbadanan Perpustakaan Awam Selangor (PPAS), UNISEL, KUIS, and several other agencies, which will serve as starting points for the reform of the Yayasan Selangor Education programme in line with the advancement of IR4.0 technology.

As we wrap up 2020, there are several key points we should look into. Economic issues, in addition to simplifying effective corporate governance, are a problem that, in my opinion, should be given greater emphasis and attention in the next year. In order to offer optimum returns to Yayasan Selangor, we should further simplify its real estate asset management. Aside from that, the reactivation of the Yayasan Selangor Education Fund may be able to assist in the funding of education programmes by enlisting the assistance and collaboration of strategic partners, particularly major enterprises in Selangor.

With the introduction of fresh ideas, I am certain that Yayasan Selangor will continue to be able to offer educational support. The continuous endeavour to



be well-structured and organized will assist Yayasan Selangor to attain its goals and be a leader at the forefront of providing quality student services.

I am hopeful that Yayasan Selangor will continue to progress and endeavour to develop the education system in order to create a generation of well-developed individuals, particularly in Selangor and throughout Malaysia. Yayasan Selangor will continue to strive for excellence in education, encouraging individuals to achieve their goals.

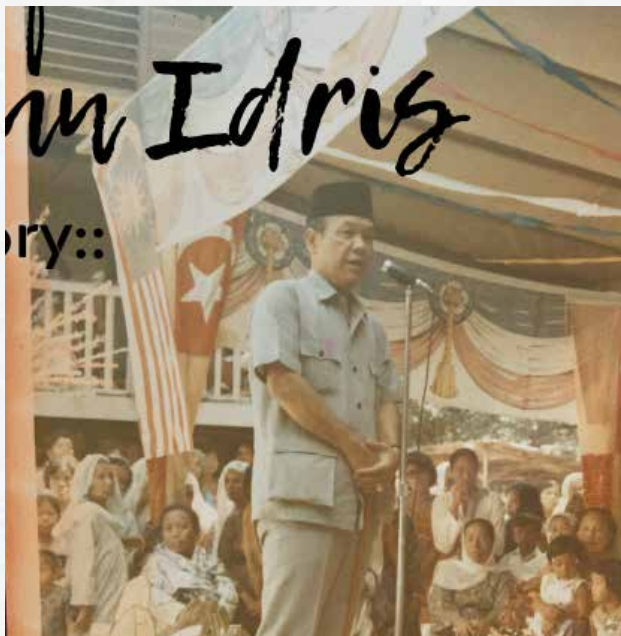


FOUNDER



The late Dato' Seri Harun Idris, the eighth Menteri Besar of Selangor, was the founder and first chairman of the Selangor Foundation.

He was a far-sighted leader and had a high awareness of the importance of knowledge. Knowledge, he believed, would help to raise society out of hardship and poverty. The result of this awareness was the establishment of the Selangor Foundation which was officially registered under the Companies Act 1965 as a company under guarantee on 5 November 1970.



1970

ESTABLISHMENT OF YAYASAN SELANGOR

The importance of education for future generations, especially students from rural areas who did not receive the opportunity of education in city schools, was of utmost importance if the disparity in education levels between the rural and city populations was to be equalized. As the best schools were situated in cities and where education was meant for the elite. Dato' Seri Harun Idris focus in the early years was to reduce this gap and to produce students with an all-round education with emphasis on Science and Mathematics.

Due to Dato' Seri Harun Idris's hard work and effort, Yayasan Selangor was able to make its mark with the official opening of the Asrama Dr. Latiff (Dr. Latiff Dormitory) on May 27, 1971, housing students from all over Selangor. Dr. Latiff was the first Malay modern medical doctor, therefore naming the dormitory after him was an apt choice in line with the goal of producing and providing Yayasan Selangor students with a background in Science and Mathematics.

HISTORY OF YAYASAN SELANGOR

1971

ASRAMA DR LATIFF, JALAN GURNEY, KUALA LUMPUR

Originally built in the early 1970s on Persiaran Gurney in Kuala Lumpur, Yayasan Selangor's premier dormitory named after Tan Sri Dato' Dr. Abdul Latiff bin Abdul Razak, who hailed from Pasir Penambang, Kuala Selangor. Dr Latiff's name was chosen to inspire students to work hard and diligently to achieve their dreams and attain success.



Asrama Dr. Latiff was officially opened by the late Dato' Harun Idris on 27 May 1971 and housed schoolboys from Victoria Institution, St. John's Institution and Methodist Boys' School, Kuala Lumpur.

1975

STUDENT INTAKE FOR ASRAMA TUN DR ISMAIL & ASRAMA TOH PUAN NORASHIKIN, KG. PANDAN, KUALA LUMPUR

Asrama Tun Dr. Ismail (Tun Dr. Ismail Dormitory) and Asrama Toh Puan Norashikin (Toh Puan Norashikin Dormitory) were first built in 1973 and completed in 1975. The hostels, named after the Second Deputy Prime Minister of Malaysia and his wife, are located at Jalan Nakhoda Yusof and Jalan Jarret, respectively.



The recruitment of students to these two hostels has given more opportunities to Selangor children to get a better education in the best schools in Kuala Lumpur and Petaling Jaya.



The students who live in this dormitory attend selected schools such as SMK Victoria, SMK St. John, SMK (L) Methodist, SMK Convent Bukit Nenas, SMK Aminuddin Baki, SMK Jln Cochrane in Kuala Lumpur, SMK (P) Sri Aman, SMK (P) Assunta, SMK (L) Bukit Bintang and SMK La Salle in Petaling Jaya.

EDUCATIONAL FINANCING FOR STUDENTS OF INSTITUTIONS OF HIGHER LEARNING

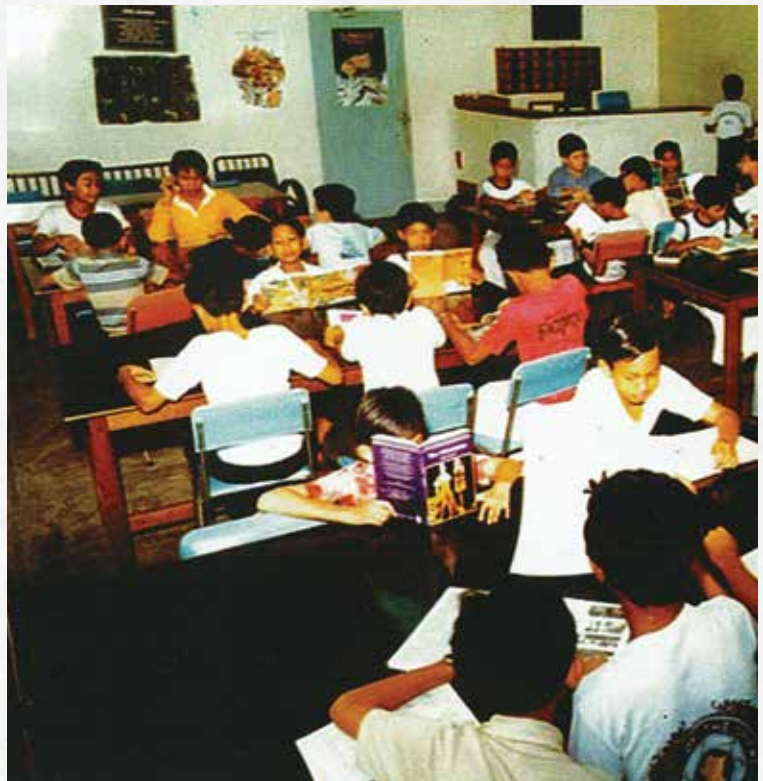
In an effort to strengthen its services, in 1984, Yayasan Selangor began funding its sponsored students who continued their studies at public institutions of higher learning (IPTA). Yayasan Selangor at that time not only provided hostel facilities to student sponsored by Yayasan Selangor under the Special Education Plan Program of the Ministry of Education Malaysia and Yayasan Selangor, but also provided Scholarships and further provided funding facilities to students who furthered their studies at institutions of higher learning.



1986

THE HIPERS PROGRAMME (HIGH PERFORMANCE RURAL SCHOOLS)

The HIPERS (High Performance Rural Schools) programme was established in 1986. The HIPERS programme was implemented in 10 primary schools in the State of Selangor. The main objective of the programme was to improve the achievement of rural students in the primary school assessment test, Ujian Penilaian Sekolah Rendah (UPSR). This programme succeeded in boosting the achievement of students and schools and improved the performance of rural students sitting for the (UPSR).



HISTORY OF YAYASAN SELANGOR

1988

INTAKE OF STUDENTS AT ASRAMA YS KLANG AND DISTRICT DORMITORIES (SMDH, SMKTD, SMKSAAS, SMKKKB) – RKPYS

Yayasan Selangor began placing its students in two schools in the Klang district, namely SMK Tengku Ampuan Rahimah and SMK Tinggi Klang before the Asrama Yayasan Selangor Klang (AYSK) student dormitory opened. In 1988, Yayasan Selangor began the placement of Form 1 students at the Asrama Yayasan Selangor Klang (AYSK) dormitory, and the resettlement of sponsored students from SMK Tengku Ampuan Rahimah and SMK Tinggi Klang.



In 1988, Yayasan Selangor placed sponsored students in four boarding schools, namely Dato' Harun Secondary School (Tanjung Karang), Telok Datok Secondary School, Sultan Abdul Aziz Shah Secondary School (Kajang) and Sekolah Menengah Kuala Kubu Bharu. These were categorized as district dormitories.

Students were also placed in the AYSK at various schools in Klang: Klang High School, La Salle School, Methodist Boys' School, Methodist Girls' School and Klang Convent. The selection of these schools was to improve the English proficiency of the sponsored students. Facilities provided at AYSK were two blocks of dormitories for male and female students called Asrama Putera and Asrama Puteri, respectively. It also included a dining hall, surau, hall, science laboratory, prep class and sports facilities such as squash courts, badminton courts and netball courts. Yayasan Selangor also provided a bus, a van and school bus rental to take students to school. The dormitory could accommodate up to 350 students.



1992

Yayasan Selangor further developed educational programmes that emphasize human character development by taking over the management of the Kem Bina Semangat (Character-Building Camp) in Ampang Pecah, Kuala Kubu Bharu, from the Selangor State Government.

The camp is located 65 km from Kuala Lumpur, in peaceful and scenic surroundings among green hills and along the banks of the Selangor River, which is suitable for training activities.





1993

ESTABLISHMENT OF INPENS COLLEGE

Yayasan Selangor made a further effort to fulfil its vision in the field of education by producing a highly-skilled and tech-savvy workforce through the establishment of INPENS College.

INPENS College achieved a position of eminence as a skills-training institution in the State of Selangor and now operates in Kuala Selangor by offering skills programs in line with the development of IR4.0 technology.



1994

STUDENT INTAKE AT ASRAMA YS SABAK BERNAM

The student dormitory at Sabak Bernam, Asrama Yayasan Selangor Sabak Bernam (AYSSB), was operational in 1994 and was officially opened at the Yayasan Selangor Silver Jubilee Celebration in 1995.

It began operating with a capacity of 100 students at that time and accommodated students of SMK Ungku Aziz and SMK Tunku Abdul Rahman in the Sabak Bernam district.



1995

STUDENT INTAKE AT ASRAMA DAERAH SMKDU - RKPYS

In 1995, Yayasan Selangor increased the student intake of its district dormitories through the placement of students at Sekolah Menengah Kebangsaan Damansara Utama under the Yayasan Selangor Special Education Plan programme.

PROGRAM PEKA 21 (ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE IN THE 21ST CENTURY) - 50 SCHOOLS IN SELANGOR

This programme was a development and transformation of the previous HIPERS programme. The PEKA 21 programme was launched to further enhance the academic excellence of students and further extended the scope of the programme to 50 schools in the state of Selangor.

ESTABLISHMENT OF YS SKILLS CENTRE (PLKYS) IN KUALA SELANGOR

This Skills Training Centre has produced 100's of skilled youths who provide electrical services across the country.

Full-time courses offered at the institute are the Single-Phase Electrical Wiring Course (PW 2) and the Refrigeration and Air Conditioning Technology Course. The Three-Phase Wiring Course (PW 4) is implemented on a part-time basis.



2008

6 GOVERNMENT-AIDED RELIGIOUS SCHOOLS JOIN THE YAYASAN SELANGOR SPECIAL EDUCATION PLAN (RKPYS)

The Yayasan Selangor Special Education Plan (RKPYS) has become a permanent fixture as a product for Yayasan Selangor.

In 2008, Yayasan Selangor increased its involvement with six government-aided religious schools (SABK) added to the RKPYS programme.



2013

MAAHAD TAHFIZ SAINS & TEKNOLOGI JAIS JOINS THE YAYASAN SELANGOR SPECIAL EDUCATION PLAN (RKPYS)

Yayasan Selangor's Special Education Plan programme further added to its student enrolment with the participation of the Maahad Tahfiz Sains & Teknologi JAIS.

In addition to academic studies, Yayasan Selangor also prioritizes religious knowledge among its students.



2014

RELAUNCHING OF HIPERS PROGRAMME

The HIPERS programme was relaunched to help more students in Selangor in terms of education, and was first reintroduced in 2014. It was implemented in 10 primary schools and 10 secondary schools in the State of Selangor.



The participants consisted of Year 6 and Form 5 students. The objective was to boost the achievement of potential rural/suburban students by continuing their education to selected schools such as SBP, MRSM and cluster schools (for UPSR graduates) and be able to continue their studies at institutions of higher learning and skills centres after SPM.

This programme had a positive impact on students and schools and is supported by the Selangor NRD. The number of students will be increased each year to provide opportunities for more students.

2017

FREE ONLINE TUITION

The Free Online Tuition Programme was an educational product first introduced on the initiative of the Selangor State Government to ensure the improvement of the standard of education in the state of Selangor. Yayasan Selangor was appointed to implement this programme together with the State Government.

In addition to topic-based learning videos for each subject, this application also offered topic-based practice questions to further enhance students' comprehension.

Registered students could review lessons easily anywhere, at any time, via their smartphone or any other device.

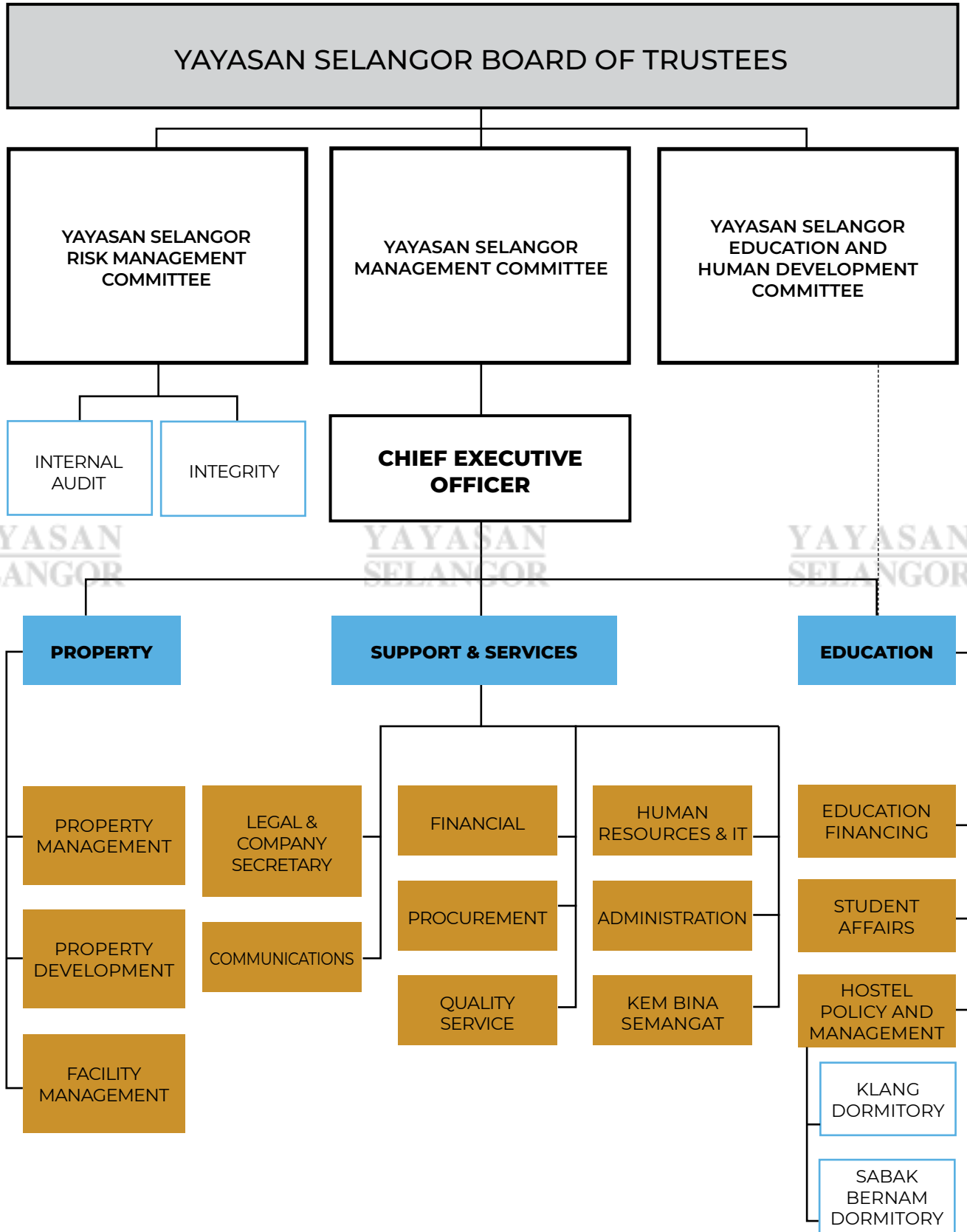

Education is the main thrust activity of Yayasan Selangor from its establishment until now—organizing and funding quality educational programmes suitable for current educational needs.

Educational programmes at the school level (primary and secondary) are the main focus of Yayasan Selangor in education, namely:

- ~ The Special Education Plan Programme of the Ministry of Education and Yayasan Selangor (RKPYS).
- ~ The High Potential Students’(HIPERS) Programme

Yayasan Selangor also continues to award scholarships to YS-sponsored students that fulfil the requirement criteria, as well as providing convertible study loans to students at institutions of higher learning (IPT) within the country, especially to those from lower-income families.

In line with the vision and mission of Yayasan Selangor, the Yayasan Selangor Strategic Education Plan 2021 is being drafted to be brought before the Human



Education and Development Committee Meeting (JKPPI) for enhancement so that Yayasan Selangor will be able to continue its vision and mission of providing effective education services that are relevant to the current time and to produce a generation of complete persons (insan kamil).

Yayasan Selangor’s Strategic Education Plan 2021 has set out the thrusts that will be the main references in terms of education. Each thrust is measured through achievements according to targets and pre-set strategies.

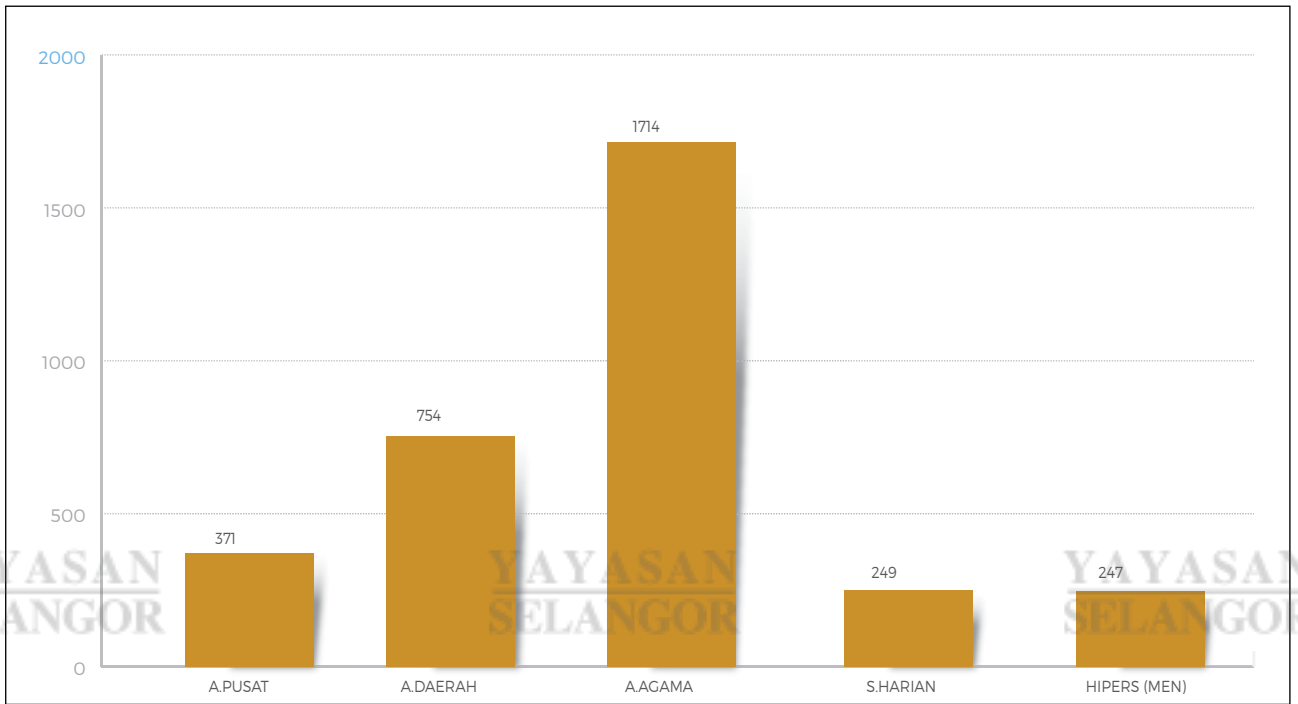

TABURAN ENROLMEN MURID



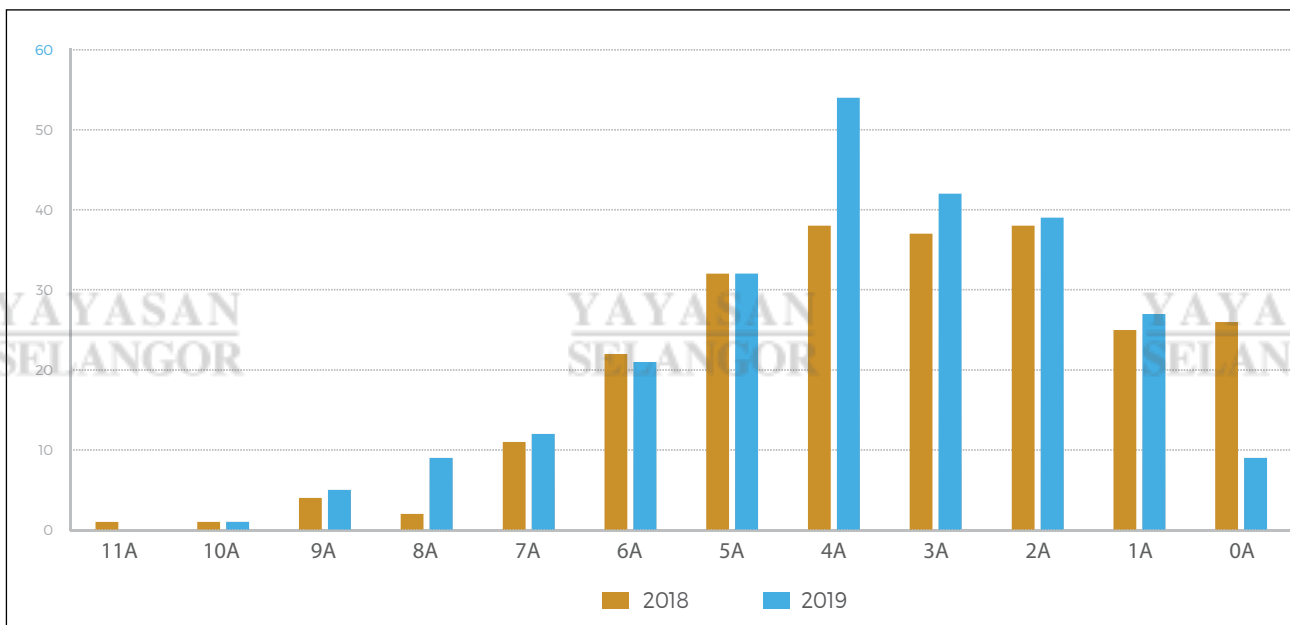

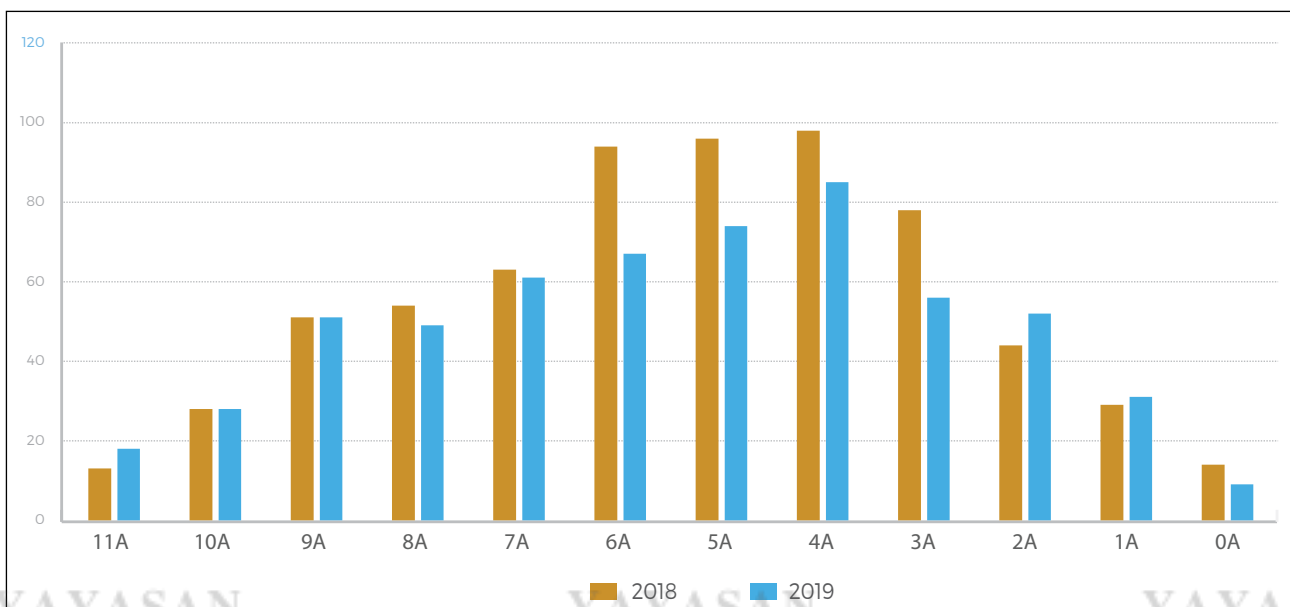
From 18 March 2020 to July 2020 and 9 September to 31 December 2020, all schools nationwide were closed due to the Covid-19 Pandemic. Thus, teaching and learning sessions could not be conducted face-to-face but only online. Schools were also unable to conduct examinations such as the mid-year and end-of-year examinations in 2020. Therefore, the achievement of students in Forms 1 to 5 could not be measured through examinations as before. This directly affected the KPIs of Yayasan Selangor dormitories, whereby KPIs were not achieved.

Following the Covid-19 pandemic, several public examinations for 2020 such as the Primary School Achievement Test (UPSR) and the Form Three Assessment (PT3) were abolished.

YAYASAN SELANGOR CENTRAL DORMITORIES

There are two Yayasan Selangor central dormitories, namely:

ASRAMA YAYASAN SELANGOR KLANG

This dormitory began operating in 1988 in Jalan Raya Barat, Klang. It is the fourth central dormitory complex built by Yayasan Selangor and the first to house both male and female students.

ASRAMA YAYASAN SELANGOR SABAK BERNAM

Established in 1994, it was inaugurated at Yayasan Selangor's Silver Jubilee Celebration in 1995. This dormitory can accommodate up to 100 students and is meant for boys only.



DORM-STUDENT ENROLLMENT

Until the end of 2019, students in the Asrama Yayasan Selangor Klang (AYSK) dormitory were placed in six schools around the Klang district. In February 2020, a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) was signed between Yayasan Selangor and the Malaysian Cricket Association, Selangor Cricket Association and SMK Sultan Abdul Samad Klang (SAS) which focuses on the development of student talent in cricket. Through the Selangor State Cricket Excellence Special Programme, a total of 17 students from SMKSAS have been placed at AYSK.

Based on the table, the total number of students placed in Yayasan Selangor's central dormitories is 371 students, consisting of 182 boys and 189 girls. The Asrama Yayasan Klang dormitory accommodates male and female students while the students at the Asrama Yayasan Selangor Sabak Bernam are only male.

Residents at AYSK consist of various ethnicities. From a total of 292 students there are 1 Chinese, 1 native and 6 Indian-descended students.

DORM-STUDENT ACTIVITIES

For 50 years, Yayasan Selangor has organised events for students that are placed in their dorms. Yayasan Selangor has been devoted to offering programmes and activities that are relevant to the current period and to producing a generation of fully developed individuals (insan kamil), with programmes spanning from student enrichment to student development.

Each dormitory, whether AYSK and AYSSB, has planned and organized their respective dormitory's annual programmes and activities.

Unfortunately, after the implementation of COVID-19 preventive measures throughout the nation, particularly in the Klang Valley, Yayasan Selangor has had a more difficult time conducting programmes and activities throughout 2020.

Despite the uphill struggle against the COVID-19 epidemic, Yayasan Selangor was able to implement a substantial number of programmes and activities in its dorms in 2020.

The following programmes and activities were carried out and conducted in Asrama Yayasan Selangor Klang from January to December 2020.

THE COVID-19 PANDEMIC

The COVID-19 (coronavirus) pandemic, often known as the coronavirus epidemic, is a worldwide disease pandemic caused by the SARS coronavirus 2. (SARS-CoV-2). The epidemic was first discovered in mid-December 2019 in Wuhan, Hubei, China, and was declared a pandemic by the World Health Organization (WHO) on March 11, 2020. To date, the pandemic has claimed the lives of a growing number of people throughout the world.



The COVID-19 virus is transmitted and spread among individuals in a manner similar to the transmission of influenza, namely through respiratory droplets from coughing or sneezing. The virus will affect the human body system beginning as early as five days up to 14 days. Common symptoms to be encountered include fever, cough and shortness of breath. A more devastating complication is that the sufferer will develop pneumonia and acute respiratory distress. Preventive measures recommended by the Malaysian Ministry of Health include hand-washing, covering the mouth when coughing, keeping distance from others (especially those who are unhealthy), and 14-day monitoring and isolation for people who suspect they have been infected.

TRANSMISSION PREVENTION

The Malaysian government announced the national execution of a Movement Control Order (PKP) on March 18, 2020, and the economic system was fully shut down at that moment. This was done in order to slow the spread of the disease. Until recently, individuals in society as a whole have had to become acclimated to embracing new living standards.

Following the development of COVID-19 across the country, particularly in the Klang Valley, Yayasan Selangor has developed a series of comprehensive preventative techniques including offices or the Yayasan Selangor central dorms. Proactive steps have been made, such as disseminating information about the COVID-19 pandemic through various infographics to all employees. Yayasan Selangor's management has also committed to give face masks and hand sanitizers to all employees in order to prevent the spread of the disease among staff members.

Furthermore, Yayasan Selangor has established the Emergency Response Team of Yayasan Selangor (ERT YS), which is responsible with planning or implementing COVID-19 preventive strategies in Yayasan Selangor, such as managing the cleanliness process in offices and Yayasan Selangor central dorms. The ERT YS team is governed by the SOPs of the Malaysian Ministries of Health (MOH) and Education (MOE), which offer standards for school opening in the new normal.

- ~ SOPs – ERT Yayasan Selangor has prepared a Standard Operation Procedure for entering the premises of Yayasan Selangor.
- ~ Awareness Video – Videos for viewing by all employees and visitors who enter Menara Yayasan Selangor
- ~ Information Poster – Various infographics are provided by the Communications Division to be shared to all employees to disseminate information and awareness about Covid-19.
- ~ Carrying out the sanitation process on the premises (offices) and facilities in the dormitories from time to time.
- ~ Providing directions and markings around the area and facilities of office and dormitories.
- ~ Conducting health and cleanliness campaigns.
- ~ Implement SOPs in the daily activities of residents and employees.

YAYASAN SELANGOR CONTRIBUTION TO COVID-19 SELANGOR FUND

Yayasan Selangor is pleased to have channelled a contribution of RM15,000.00 to the COVID-19 fund in an effort to prevent the spread of COVID-19 through assistance from the Selangor State Government to the people in this state. 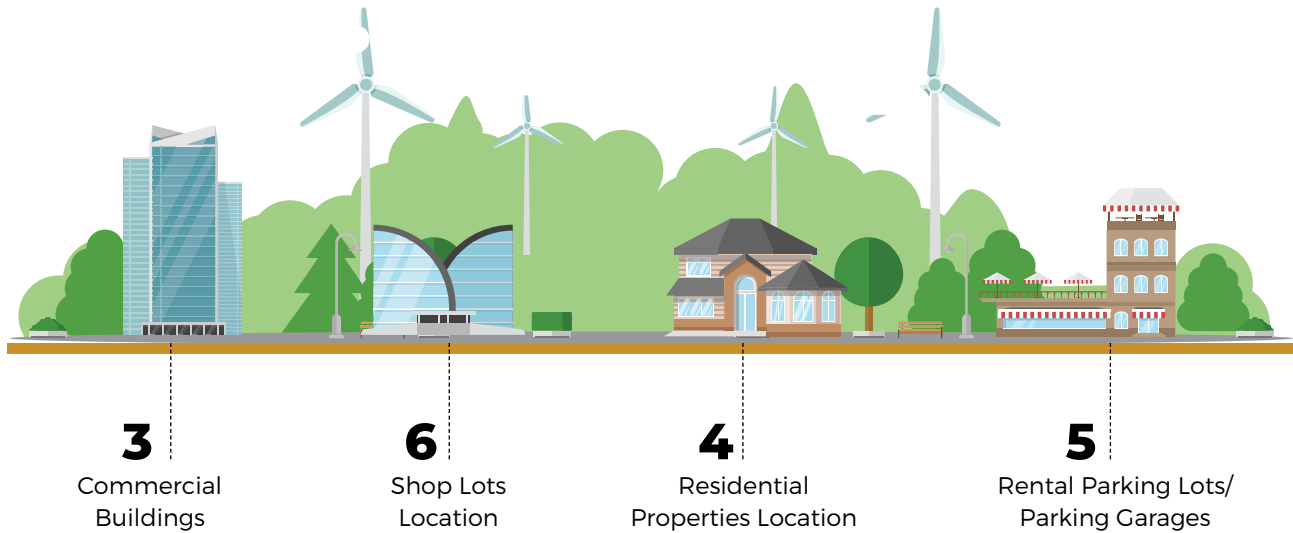
SUSTAINABLE PROPERTY MANAGEMENT & DEVELOPMENT

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

31 DECEMBER 2020

1. CORPORATE INFORMATION

Yayasan Selangor ("The Foundation") is limited by guarantee, incorporated and domiciled in Malaysia.

The registered office and principal place of business of the Foundation is located at Menara Yayasan Selangor, No. 18A, Jalan Persiaran Barat, 46000 Petaling Jaya, Selangor Darul Ehsan.

The financial statements are presented in Ringgit Malaysia ('RM'), which is also the functional currency of the Foundation.

The financial statements were authorised for issue in accordance with a resolution by the Board of Trustees on 23 August 2021

2. PRINCIPAL ACTIVITIES

The Foundation is principally engaged in assisting and encouraging the education of Malaysians especially citizens of Selangor through funding generated from rental of building premises and joint venture projects. The principal activities and details of the subsidiary is disclosed in Note 9 to the financial statements. There have been no significant changes in the nature of these activities of the Group and of the Foundation during the financial year.

3. BASIS OF PREPARATION

The financial statements of the Group and of the Foundation have been prepared in accordance with Malaysian Financial Reporting Standards ("MFRSs"), International Financial Reporting Standards ("IFRSs") and the provisions of the Companies Act 2016 in Malaysia.

4. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

4.1 Basis of accounting

The financial statements of the Group and of the Foundation have been prepared under the historical cost convention except as otherwise stated in the financial statements.

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with MFRSs requires the Trustees to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets, liabilities, revenue and expenses and disclosure of contingent assets and contingent liabilities. In addition, the Trustees are also required to exercise their judgement in the process of applying the accounting policies. The areas involving such judgements, estimates and assumptions are disclosed in Note 6 to the financial statements. Although these estimates and assumptions are based on the Trustees' best knowledge of events and actions, actual results could differ from those estimates.

The consolidated financial statements incorporate the financial statements of the Foundation and all its subsidiaries. Control is achieved when the Group is exposed, or has rights, to variable returns from its involvement with the investee and has the ability to affect those returns through its power over the investee. Specifically, the Group controls an investee if and only if the Group has:

4.2 Basis of consolidation

- (a) Power over the investee;
- (b) Exposure, or rights, to variable returns from its involvement with the investee; and
- (c) The ability to use its power over the investee to affect its returns.

If the Group has less than a majority of the voting or similar rights of an investee, the Group considers all relevant facts and circumstances in assessing whether it has power over an investee, including:

- (a) The contractual arrangement with the other vote holders of the investee;
- (b) Rights arising from other contractual agreements; and
- (c) The voting rights of the Group and potential voting rights.

Intragroup balances, transactions, income and expenses are eliminated on consolidation. Unrealised gains arising from transactions with associates and joint ventures are eliminated against the investment to the extent of the interest of the Group in the investee. Unrealised losses are eliminated in the same way as unrealised gains, but only to the extent that there is no impairment.

The financial statements of the subsidiaries are prepared for the same reporting period as that of the Foundation, using consistent accounting policies. Where necessary, accounting policies of subsidiaries are changed to ensure consistency with the policies adopted by the other entities in the Group.

Non-controlling interests represent equity in subsidiaries that are not attributable, directly or indirectly, to owners of the parent, and is presented separately in the consolidated statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income and within equity in the consolidated statement of financial position, separately from equity attributable to owners of the Foundation. Profit or loss and each component of other comprehensive income are attributed to the owners of the parent and to the non-controlling interests. Total comprehensive income is attributed to non-controlling interests even if this results in the non-controlling interests having a deficit balance.

The Group re-assesses whether or not it controls an investee if facts and circumstances indicate that there are changes to one or more of the three elements of control. Subsidiaries are consolidated from the date on which control is transferred to the Group up to the effective date on which control ceases, as appropriate. Assets, liabilities, income and expenses of a subsidiary acquired or disposed of during the financial year are included in the statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income from the date the Group gains control until the date the Group ceases to control the subsidiary.

Changes in the Foundation owners' ownership interest in a subsidiary that do not result in a loss of control are accounted for as equity transactions. In such circumstances, the carrying amounts of the controlling and non-controlling interests are adjusted to reflect the changes in their relative interests in the subsidiary. Any difference between the amount by which the non-controlling interest is adjusted and the fair value of consideration paid or received is recognised directly in equity and attributed to owners of the parent.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

31 DECEMBER 2020 (cont'd)

4. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

4.2 Basis of consolidation (continued)

If the Group loses control of a subsidiary, the profit or loss on disposal is calculated as the difference between:

- (i) The aggregate of the fair value of the consideration received and the fair value of any retained interest; and
- (ii) The previous carrying amount of the assets (including goodwill), and liabilities of the subsidiary and any non-controlling interests.

Amounts previously recognised in other comprehensive income in relation to the subsidiary are accounted for (i.e. reclassified to profit or loss or transferred directly to retained earnings) in the same manner as would be required if the relevant assets or liabilities were disposed of. The fair value of any investments retained in the former subsidiary at the date when control is lost is regarded as the fair value on initial recognition for subsequent accounting where applicable, the cost on initial recognition of an investment in associate or joint venture.

4.3 Business combinations

Business combinations are accounted for by applying the acquisition method of accounting.

Identifiable assets acquired, liabilities and contingent liabilities assumed in a business combination are measured at their fair value at the acquisition date, except that:

- (a) Deferred tax assets or liabilities and liabilities or assets related to employee benefit arrangements are recognised and measured in accordance with MFRS 112 Income Taxes and MFRS 119 Employee Benefits respectively;
- (b) Liabilities or equity instruments related to share-based payment transactions of the acquiree or the replacement by the Group of an acquiree's share-based payment transactions are measured in accordance with MFRS 2 Share-based Payment at the acquisition date; and
- (c) Assets (or disposal groups) that are classified as held for sale in accordance with MFRS 5 Non-current Assets Held for Sale and Discontinued Operations are measured in accordance with that Standard.

Acquisition-related costs are recognised as expenses in the periods in which the costs are incurred and the services are received.

Any contingent consideration payable is recognised at fair value at the acquisition date. Measurement period adjustments to contingent consideration are dealt with as follows:

- (a) If the contingent consideration is classified as equity, it is not remeasured and settlement is accounted for within equity.
- (b) Subsequent changes to contingent consideration classified as an asset or liability that is a financial instrument within the scope of MFRS 139 are recognised either in profit or loss or in other comprehensive income in accordance with MFRS 139. All other subsequent changes are recognised in profit or loss.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

4. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

4.3 Business combinations (continued)

In a business combination achieved in stages, previously held equity interests in the acquiree are re-measured to fair value at the acquisition date and any corresponding gain or loss is recognised in profit or loss.

Components of non-controlling interests in the acquiree that are present ownership interests and entitle their holders to a proportionate share of the entity's net assets in the event of liquidation are initially measured at fair value. All other components of non-controlling interests shall be measured at their acquisition-date fair values, unless another measurement basis is required by MFRSs. The choice of measurement basis is made on a combination-by-combination basis. Subsequent to initial recognition, the carrying amount of non-controlling interests is the amount of those interests at initial recognition plus the non-controlling interests' share of subsequent changes in equity.

Any excess of the sum of the fair value of the consideration transferred in the business combination, the amount of non-controlling interest in the acquiree (if any), and the fair value of the previously held equity interest of the Group in the acquiree (if any), over the net fair value of the acquiree's identifiable assets and liabilities is recorded as goodwill in the statement of financial position. The accounting policy for goodwill is set out in Note 4.8(a) to the financial statements. In instances where the latter amount exceeds the former, the excess is recognised as a gain on bargain purchase in profit or loss on the acquisition date.

4.4 Property, plant and equipment and depreciation

All items of property, plant and equipment are initially measured at cost. Cost includes expenditure that is directly attributable to the acquisition of the asset.

Subsequent costs are included in the asset's carrying amount or recognised as a separate asset, as appropriate, only when the cost is incurred and it is probable that the future economic benefits associated with the asset would flow to the Group and the cost of the asset could be measured reliably. The carrying amount of parts that are replaced is derecognised. The costs of the day-to-day servicing of property, plant and equipment are recognised in profit or loss as incurred. Cost also comprises the initial estimate of dismantling and removing the asset and restoring the site on which it is located for which the Group is obligated to incur when the asset is acquired, if applicable.

Each part of an item of property, plant and equipment with a cost that is significant in relation to the total cost of the asset and which has different useful life, is depreciated separately.

After initial recognition, property, plant and equipment except for freehold land and buildings are stated at cost less any accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment losses. Freehold land and buildings are stated at valuation, which is the fair value at the date of revaluation less any subsequent accumulated depreciation and subsequent accumulated impairment losses.

Freehold land and buildings are revalued at least every one (1) to five (5) years to ensure that the carrying amount does not differ materially from that which would be determined using fair value at the end of each reporting period. The surplus arising from such revaluations is credited to shareholders' equity as a revaluation reserve, net of deferred tax, if any, and any subsequent deficit is offset against such surplus to the extent of a previous increase for the same property. In all other cases, the deficit would be charged to profit or loss. For a revaluation increase subsequent to a revaluation deficit of the same asset, the surplus is recognised as income to the extent that it reverses the deficit previously recognised as an expense with the balance of increase credited to revaluation reserve.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

31 DECEMBER 2020 (cont'd)

4. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

4.4 Property, plant and equipment and depreciation (continued)

Depreciation is calculated to write off the cost or valuation of the assets to their residual values on a straight line basis over their estimated useful lives. The principal depreciation periods and rates are as follows:

Building	2% - 10%
Lift	10%
Motor vehicle	20% - 25%
Furniture, fixtures and fittings	10% - 25%
Office renovation	10% - 25%
Leasehold land	over 99 years

Freehold land has unlimited useful life and is not depreciated. Construction-in-progress represents machinery under installation and renovation-in-progress and is stated at cost. Construction-in-progress is not depreciated until such time when the asset is available for use.

At the end of each reporting period, the carrying amount of an item of property, plant and equipment is assessed for impairment when events or changes in circumstances indicate that its carrying amount may not be recoverable. A write down is made if the carrying amount exceeds the recoverable amount (see Note 4.7 to the financial statements on impairment of non-financial assets).

The residual values, useful lives and depreciation method are reviewed at the end of each reporting period to ensure that the amount, method and period of depreciation are consistent with previous estimates and the expected pattern of consumption of the future economic benefits embodied in the items of property, plant and equipment. If expectations differ from previous estimates, the changes are accounted for as a change in an accounting estimate.

The carrying amount of an item of property, plant and equipment is derecognised on disposal or when no future economic benefits are expected from its use or disposal. The difference between the net disposal proceeds, if any, and the carrying amount is included in profit or loss and the revaluation surplus related to those assets, if any, is transferred directly to retained earnings.

4.5 Investment property

Investment properties are properties which are held to earn rental yields or for capital appreciation or for both and are not occupied by the Group. Investment properties also include properties that are being constructed or developed for future use as investment properties. Investment properties are initially measured at cost, which includes transaction costs. After initial recognition, investment properties are stated at cost less any accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment losses.

Depreciation is calculated to write off the cost or valuation of the investment properties to their residual values on a straight line basis over their estimated useful lives.

At the end of each reporting period, the carrying amount of an item of the investment properties are assessed for impairment when events or changes in circumstances indicate that its carrying amount may not be recoverable. A write down is made if the carrying amount exceeds the recoverable amount (see Note 4.7 to the financial statements on impairment of non-financial assets).

4.5 Investment property (continued)

The residual values, useful lives and depreciation method are reviewed at the end of each reporting period to ensure that the amount, method and period of depreciation are consistent with previous estimates and the expected pattern of consumption of the future economic benefits embodied in the investment properties. If expectations differ from previous estimates, the changes are accounted for as a change in an accounting estimate.

Investment properties are derecognised when either they have been disposed of or when they are permanently withdrawn from use and no future economic benefit is expected from their disposal. The gains or losses arising from the retirement or disposal of investment property is determined as the difference between the net disposal proceeds, if any, and the carrying amount of the asset and is recognised in profit or loss in the period of the retirement or disposal.

A gain or loss arising from a change in the fair value of investment properties is recognised in profit or loss for the period in which it arises.

Investment properties are derecognised when either they have been disposed of or when they are permanently withdrawn from use and no future economic benefit is expected from their disposal. The gains or losses arising from the retirement or disposal of investment property is determined as the difference between the net disposal proceeds, if any, and the carrying amount of the asset and is recognised in profit or loss in the period of the retirement or disposal.

4.6 Subsidiary

A subsidiary is an entity in which the Group and the Foundation are exposed, or have rights, to variable returns from its involvement with the subsidiary and have the ability to affect those returns through its power over the subsidiary.

An investment in subsidiary, which is eliminated on consolidation, is stated in the separate financial statements of the Foundation at cost (or in accordance with MFRS 139). Put options written over non-controlling interests on the acquisition of subsidiary shall be included as part of the cost of investment in the separate financial statements of the Foundation. Subsequent changes in the fair value of the written put options over non-controlling interests shall be recognised in profit or loss. Investments accounted for at cost shall be accounted for in accordance with MFRS 5 Non-current Assets Held for Sale and Discontinued Operations when they are classified as held for sale (or included in a disposal group that is classified as held for sale) in accordance with MFRS 5.

When control of a subsidiary is lost as a result of a transaction, event or other circumstance, the Group would derecognise all assets, liabilities and non-controlling interests at their carrying amount and to recognise the fair value of the consideration received. Any retained interest in the former subsidiary is recognised at its fair value at the date control is lost. The resulting difference is recognised as a gain or loss in profit or loss.

4.7 Impairment of non-financial assets

The carrying amount of assets, except for financial assets (excluding investments in subsidiaries, associates and a joint venture), inventories, deferred tax assets, investment properties measured at fair value and non-current assets (or disposal groups) held for sale, are reviewed at the end of each reporting period to determine whether there is any indication of impairment. If any such indication exists, the asset's recoverable amount is estimated.

4.7 Impairment of non-financial assets (continued)

The recoverable amount of an asset is estimated for an individual asset. Where it is not possible to estimate the recoverable amount of the individual asset, the impairment test is carried out on the cash generating unit ('CGU') to which the asset belongs. Goodwill acquired in a business combination is from the acquisition date, allocated to each of the CGU or groups of CGU of the Group that are expected to benefit from the synergies of the combination giving rise to the goodwill irrespective of whether other assets or liabilities of the acquiree are assigned to those units or groups of units.

The recoverable amount of an asset or CGU is the higher of its fair value less cost to sell and its value in use.

In estimating the value in use, the estimated future cash inflows and outflows to be derived from continuing use of the asset and from its ultimate disposal are discounted to their present value using a pre-tax discount rate that reflects current market assessments of the time value of money and the risks specific to the asset for which the future cash flow estimates have not been adjusted. An impairment loss is recognised in profit or loss when the carrying amount of the asset or the CGU, including the goodwill or intangible asset, exceeds the recoverable amount of the asset or the CGU. The total impairment loss is allocated, first, to reduce the carrying amount of any goodwill allocated to the CGU and then to the other assets of the CGU on a pro-rata basis of the carrying amount of each asset in the CGU.

The impairment loss is recognised in profit or loss immediately except for the impairment on a revalued asset where the impairment loss is recognised directly against the revaluation reserve to the extent of the surplus credited from the previous revaluation for the same asset with the excess of the impairment loss charged to profit or loss.

An impairment loss on goodwill is not reversed in subsequent periods. An impairment loss for other assets is reversed if, and only if, there has been a change in the estimates used to determine the assets' recoverable amount since the last impairment loss was recognised.

An impairment loss is reversed only to the extent that the asset's carrying amount does not exceed the carrying amount that would have been determined, net of depreciation or amortisation, if no impairment loss had been recognised.

Such reversals are recognised as income immediately in profit or loss except for the reversal of an impairment loss on a revalued asset where the reversal of the impairment loss is treated as a revaluation increase and credited to the revaluation reserve account of the same asset. However, to the extent that an impairment loss in the same revalued asset was previously recognised in profit or loss, a reversal of that impairment loss is also recognised in profit or loss.

4.8 Financial instruments

A financial instrument is any contract that gives rise to a financial asset of one enterprise and a financial liability or equity instrument of another enterprise.

A financial asset is any asset that is cash, an equity instrument of another enterprise, a contractual right to receive cash or another financial asset from another enterprise, or a contractual right to exchange financial assets or financial liabilities with another enterprise under conditions that are potentially favourable to the Group.

4.8 Financial instruments (continued)

A financial liability is any liability that is a contractual obligation to deliver cash or another financial asset to another enterprise, or a contractual obligation to exchange financial assets or financial liabilities with another enterprise under conditions that are potentially unfavourable to the Group.

Financial instruments are recognised on the statement of financial position when the Group has become a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument. At initial recognition, a financial instrument is recognised at fair value plus, in the case of a financial instrument not at fair value through profit or loss, transaction costs that are directly attributable to the acquisition or issuance of the financial instrument.

An embedded derivative is separated from the host contract and accounted for as a derivative if, and only if the economic characteristics and risks of the embedded derivative is not closely related to the economic characteristics and risks of the host contract, a separate instrument with the same terms as the embedded derivative meets the definition of a derivative, and the hybrid instrument is not measured at fair value through profit or loss.

(a) Financial assets

A financial asset is classified into the following categories after initial recognition for the purpose of subsequent measurement:

(i) Amortised cost

Amortised cost category comprises financial assets that are held within a business model whose objective is to hold assets to collect contractual cash flows and its contractual terms give rise on specified dates to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding. The financial assets are not designated as fair value through profit or loss.

Subsequent to initial recognition, these financial assets are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method. The amortised cost is reduced by impairment losses. Interest income, foreign exchange gains and losses and impairment are recognised in profit or loss. Any gain or loss on derecognition is recognised in profit or loss.

(ii) Fair value through other comprehensive income

a. Debt investment

Fair value through other comprehensive income category comprises debt investment where it is held within a business model whose objective is achieved by both collecting contractual cash flows and selling the debt investment, and its contractual terms give rise on specified dates to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding.

The debt investment is not designated as at fair value through profit or loss. Interest income calculated using the effective interest method, foreign exchange gains and losses and impairment are recognised in profit or loss. Other net gains and losses are recognised in other comprehensive income.

(ii) Fair value through other comprehensive income (continued)

a. Debt investment (continued)

On derecognition, gains and losses accumulated in other comprehensive income are reclassified to profit or loss. Interest income is recognised by applying effective interest rate to the gross carrying amount except for credit impaired financial assets where the effective interest rate is applied to the amortised cost.

b. Equity investments

This category comprises investment in equity that is not held for trading, and the Group and the Company irrevocably elect to present subsequent changes in the investment's fair value in other comprehensive income. This election is made on an investment-by-investment basis. Dividends are recognised as income in profit or loss unless the dividend clearly represents a recovery of part of the cost of investment. Other net gains and losses are recognised in other comprehensive income. On derecognition, gains and losses accumulated in other comprehensive income are not reclassified to profit or loss.

(iii) Fair value through profit or loss

All financial assets not measured at amortised cost or fair value through other comprehensive income as described above are measured at fair value through profit or loss. This includes derivative financial assets (except for a derivative that is a designated and effective hedging instrument). On initial recognition, the Group or the Company may irrevocably designate a financial asset that otherwise meets the requirements to be measured at amortised cost or at fair value through other comprehensive income as at fair value through profit or loss if doing so eliminates or significantly reduces an accounting mismatch that would otherwise arise.

Financial assets categorised as fair value through profit or loss are subsequently measured at their fair value. Net gains or losses, including any interest or dividend income, are recognized in the profit or loss. All financial assets, except for those measured at fair value through profit or loss and equity investments measured at fair value through other comprehensive income, are subject to impairment assessment.

- if doing so eliminates or significantly reduces an accounting mismatch that would otherwise arise;
- a group of financial liabilities or assets and financial liabilities is managed and its performance is evaluated on a fair value basis, in accordance with a documented risk management or investment strategy, and information about the group is provided internally on that basis to the Group's key management personnel; or
- if a contract contains one or more embedded derivatives and the host is not a financial asset in the scope of MFRS 9, where the embedded derivative significantly modifies the cash flows and separation is not prohibited.

(b) Financial liabilities

(i) Fair value through profit or loss

Fair value through profit or loss category comprises financial liabilities that are derivatives (except for a derivative that is a financial guarantee contract or a designated and effective hedging instrument), contingent consideration in a business combination and financial liabilities that are specifically designated into this category upon initial recognition.

On initial recognition, the Group or the Company may irrevocably designate a financial liability that otherwise meets the requirements to be measured at amortised cost as at fair value through profit or loss:

Financial liabilities categorised as fair value through profit or loss are subsequently measured at their fair value with gains or losses, including any interest expense are recognised in the profit or loss.

For financial liabilities where it is designated as fair value through profit or loss upon initial recognition, the Group and the Company recognise the amount of change in fair value of the financial liability that is attributable to change in credit risk in the other comprehensive income and remaining amount of the change in fair value in the profit or loss, unless the treatment of the effects of changes in the liability's credit risk would create or enlarge an accounting mismatch.

(ii) Amortised cost

Other financial liabilities not categorised as fair value through profit or loss are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

Interest expense and foreign exchange gains and losses are recognised in the profit or loss. Any gains or losses on derecognition are also recognised in the profit or loss.

4.9 Impairment of financial assets

The Group assesses whether there is any objective evidence that a financial asset is impaired at the end of each reporting period.

Held-to-maturity investments and loans and receivables

The Group collectively considers factors such as the probability of bankruptcy or significant financial difficulties of the receivable, and default or significant delay in payments by the receivable, to determine whether there is objective evidence that an impairment loss on held-to-maturity investments and loans and receivables has occurred. Other objective evidence of impairment include historical collection rates determined on an individual basis and observable changes in national or local economic conditions that are directly correlated with the historical default rates of receivables.

If any such objective evidence exists, the amount of impairment loss is measured as the difference between the financial asset's carrying amount and the present value of estimated future cash flows discounted at the financial asset's original effective interest rate. The impairment loss is recognised in profit or loss.

4.9 Impairment of financial assets (continued)

Impairment losses in respect of unquoted equity instrument that is carried at cost is recognised in profit or loss and is measured as the difference between the financial asset's carrying amount and the present value of estimated future cash flows discounted at the current market rate of return for a similar financial asset.

Impairment losses on available-for-sale equity investments are not reversed in profit or loss in the subsequent periods. Instead, any increase in the fair value subsequent to the impairment loss is recognised in other comprehensive income.

Impairment losses on available-for-sale debt investments are subsequently reversed in profit or loss if the increase in the fair value of the investment can be objectively related to an event occurring after the recognition of the impairment loss in profit or loss.

4.10 Income taxes

Income taxes include all domestic and foreign taxes on taxable profit. Income taxes also include other taxes, such as withholding taxes, which are payable by a foreign subsidiary, associate, a joint venture or a joint operation on distributions to the Group and Foundation, and real property gains taxes payable on disposal of properties.

Taxes in the profit or loss and other comprehensive income comprise current tax and deferred tax.

(a) Current tax

Current tax expenses are determined according to the tax laws of each jurisdiction in which the Group operates and include all taxes based upon the taxable profits (including withholding taxes payable by foreign subsidiaries on distribution of retained earnings to companies in the Group), and real property gains taxes payable on disposal of properties.

(b) Deferred tax

Deferred tax is recognised in full using the liability method on temporary differences arising between the carrying amount of an asset or liability in the statement of financial position and its tax base.

Deferred tax is recognised for all temporary differences, unless the deferred tax arises from goodwill or the initial recognition of an asset or liability in a transaction which is not a business combination and at the time of transaction, affects neither accounting profit nor taxable profit.

A deferred tax asset, including tax benefits arising from investment tax credits, is recognised only to the extent that it is probable that future taxable profits would be available against which the deductible temporary differences, unused tax losses and unused tax credits can be utilised. The carrying amount of a deferred tax asset is reviewed at the end of each reporting period. If it is no longer probable that sufficient taxable profits would be available to allow the benefit of part or all of that deferred tax asset to be utilised, the carrying amount of the deferred tax asset would be reduced accordingly. When it becomes probable that sufficient taxable profits would be available, such reductions would be reversed to the extent of the taxable profits.

(b) Deferred tax (continued)

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are offset when there is a legally enforceable right to set off current tax assets against current tax liabilities and when the deferred income taxes relate to the same taxation authority on either:

- (i) The same taxable entity; or
- (ii) Different taxable entities which intend either to settle current tax liabilities and assets on a net basis, or to realise the assets and settle the liabilities simultaneously, in each future period in which significant amounts of deferred tax liabilities or assets are expected to be settled or recovered.

Deferred tax would be recognised as income or expense and included in the profit or loss for the period unless the tax relates to items that are credited or charged, in the same or a different period, directly to equity, in which case the deferred tax would be charged or credited directly to equity.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are measured at the tax rates that are expected to apply to the year when the asset is realised or the liability is settled, based on the announcement of tax rates (and tax laws) by the Government in the annual budgets which have the substantive effect of actual enactment by the end of each reporting period.

4.11 Provisions

Provisions are recognised when there is a present obligation, legal or constructive, as a result of a past event, when it is probable that an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits would be required to settle the obligation and a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation. (Where the Group expects a provision to be reimbursed (for example, under an insurance contract), the reimbursement is recognised as a separate asset but only when the reimbursement is virtually certain.)

If the effect of the time value of money is material, the amount of a provision would be discounted to its present value at a pre-tax rate that reflects current market assessments of the time value of money and the risks specific to the liability.

Provisions are reviewed at the end of each reporting period and adjusted to reflect the current best estimate. If it is no longer probable that an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits would be required to settle the obligation, the provision would be reversed.

Provisions for restructuring are recognised when the Group has approved a detailed formal restructuring plan, and the restructuring either has commenced or has been announced publicly.

Provisions are not recognised for future operating losses. If the Group has a contract that is onerous, the present obligation under the contract shall be recognised and measured as a provision.

4.12 Contingent liabilities and contingent assets

A contingent liability is a possible obligation that arises from past events whose existence would be confirmed by the occurrence or non-occurrence of one or more uncertain future events beyond the control of the Group or a present obligation that is not recognised because it is not probable that an outflow of resources would be required to settle the obligation. A contingent liability also arises in extremely rare cases where there is a liability that cannot be recognised because it cannot be measured reliably. The Group does not recognise a contingent liability but discloses its existence in the financial statements.

A contingent asset is a possible asset that arises from past events whose existence would be confirmed by the occurrence or non-occurrence of one or more uncertain future events beyond the control of the Group. The Group does not recognise contingent assets but disclose its existence where inflows of economic benefits are probable, but not virtually certain.

In the acquisition of subsidiaries by the Group under business combinations, contingent liabilities assumed are measured initially at their fair value at the acquisition date.

4.13 Employee benefits

(a) Short term employee benefits

Wages, salaries, social security contributions, paid annual leave, paid sick leave, bonuses and non-monetary benefits are measured on an undiscounted basis and are expensed when employees rendered their services to the Group.

Short term accumulating compensated absences such as paid annual leave are recognised as an expense when employees render services that increase their entitlement to future compensated absences. Short term non-accumulating compensated absences such as sick leave are recognised when the absences occur and they lapse if the current period's entitlement is not used in full and do not entitle employees to a cash payment for unused entitlement on leaving the Group.

Bonuses are recognised as an expense when there is a present, legal or constructive obligation to make such payments, as a result of past events and when a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation.

(b) Defined contribution plans

The Foundation and its subsidiaries incorporated in Malaysia make contributions to a statutory provident fund and foreign subsidiaries make contributions to their respective countries' statutory pension schemes. The contributions are recognised as a liability after deducting any contribution already paid and as an expense in the period in which the employees render their services.

(c) Defined benefit plans

The Group operates a funded defined benefit plan for eligible employees of the Group.

(c) Defined benefit plans (continued)

The recognition and measurement of the defined benefits plan involve:

- (i) Determining the deficit or surplus by:
 - (a) Using an actuarial technique, the projected unit credit method, to make a reliable estimate of the ultimate cost to the Group of the benefit that employees have earned in return for their service in the current and prior periods;
 - (b) Discounting that benefit in order to determine the present value of the defined benefit obligation and the current service cost; and
 - (c) Deducting the fair value of any plan assets from the present value of the defined benefit obligation;
- (ii) Determining the amount of the net defined benefit liability (asset) as the amount of the deficit or surplus as determined above, adjusted for any effect of limiting a net defined benefit asset to the asset ceiling; and
- (iii) Determining amounts to be recognised in profit or loss, i.e. current service cost, any past service cost and gain or loss on settlement and net interest on the net defined benefit liability (asset).

The Group determines the net defined benefit liability (asset) annually so that the amounts recognised in the financial statements do not differ materially from the amounts that would be determined at the end of the reporting period.

The Group recognises the net defined benefit liability (asset) in the statement of financial position.

The cost of providing benefits under the defined benefit plan is determined using the projected unit credit method.

The Group uses the yield rate of high quality government or corporate bonds which have AA rating or higher to discount the post-employment benefit obligations. The currency and term of the government bonds (corporate bonds) are consistent with the currency and estimated term of the post-employment benefit obligations of the Group.

The remeasurement of the net defined obligation are recognised directly within equity. The remeasurement include:

- (i) Actuarial gains and losses;
- (ii) Return on plan assets, excluding interest; and
- (iii) Any asset ceiling effects, excluding interest.

Services costs are recognised in profit or loss, and include current and past service costs as well as gains and losses on curtailments.

(c) Defined benefit plans (continued)

Net interest expense (income) is recognised in profit or loss, and is calculated by applying the discount rate used to measure the defined benefit obligation (asset) at the beginning of the annual period to the balance of the net defined benefit obligation (asset), considering the effects of contributions and benefit payments during the reporting period. Gains or losses arising from changes to scheme benefits or scheme curtailment are recognised immediately in profit or loss.

Settlement of defined benefit schemes are recognised in the period when the settlement occurs.

If the Group has an unconditional right to a refund during the life of the plan, it would recognise an asset measured as the amount of the surplus at the end of the reporting period that it has a right to receive a refund which would be the fair value of the plan assets less the present value of the defined benefits obligation, less any associated costs, such as taxes. If the amount of a refund is determined as the full amount or a proportion of the surplus, rather than a fixed amount, the Group would make no adjustment for the time value of money, even if the refund is realisable only at a future date.

If there is no minimum funding requirement for contributions relating to future service, the economic benefit available as a reduction in future contributions is the present value of future service cost to the entity at the end of each reporting period over the shorter of the expected life of the plan and the expected life of the entity. The Group would assume no change to the benefits provided by a plan in the future until the plan is amended and shall assume a stable workforce in the future unless it is demonstrably committed at the end of the reporting period to make a reduction in the number of employees covered by the plan.

(d) Share-based payments

The Group operates an equity-settled, share-based compensation plan, under which the Group receives services from employees as consideration for equity instruments of the Group. The fair value of the employee services received in exchange for the grant of the options is recognised as an expense.

The total amount to be expensed is determined by reference to the fair value of the options granted including any market performance conditions but excluding the impact of any non-market performance and service vesting conditions.

Non-market performance and service conditions are included in assumptions about the number of options that are expected to vest. The total expense is recognised over the vesting period, which is the period over which all of the specified vesting conditions are to be satisfied.

In addition, in some circumstances employees could provide services in advance of the grant date and therefore the grant date fair value is estimated for the purposes of recognising the expense during the period between service commencement period and grant date.

At the end of each reporting period, the Group revises its estimates of the number of options that are expected to vest based on the non-market vesting conditions. The Group recognises the impact of the revision to original estimates, if any, in the profit or loss, with a corresponding adjustment to equity.

(d) Share-based payments (continued)

If the options are exercised, the Foundation issues new shares to the employees. The proceeds received, net of any directly attributable transaction costs are recognised in ordinary share capital at nominal value, and any excess would be recognised in share premium.

(e) Termination benefits

Termination benefits are payments due to employees as a result of the decision of the Group to terminate the employment or an employee's decision to accept an offer of benefits by the Group in exchange for termination of employment. They are recognised as a liability and an expense at the earlier of the following dates:

- (i) when the Group has a detailed formal plan for termination where it can no longer withdraw the offer of those benefits; and
- (ii) when the Group recognises costs for a restructuring and involves the payment of termination benefits.

Subsequent to initial recognition, the Group applies the requirements for post-employment benefits by measuring and recognising subsequent changes in accordance with the nature of the employee benefits. Otherwise:

- (i) if the termination benefits are expected to be settled wholly before twelve months after the end of the reporting period, the Group applies the requirements for short-term employee benefits.
- (ii) if the termination benefits are not expected to be settled wholly before twelve months after the end of the reporting period, the Group applies the requirements for other long-term employee benefits.

4.14 Revenue recognition

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivables, net of discounts and rebates.

Revenue is recognised to the extent that it is probable that the economic benefits associated with the transaction would flow to the Group, and the amount of revenue and the cost incurred or to be incurred in respect of the transaction can be reliably measured and specific recognition criteria have been met for each of the activities of the Group as follows:

(a) Services

Revenue in respect of the rendering of services is recognised when the stage of completion at the end of each reporting period and the cost incurred can be reliably measured. The stage of completion is determined by the services performed to date as a percentage of total services to be performed.

- (b) Dividend income

Dividend income is recognised when the right to receive payment is established.

- (c) Rental income

Rental income is accounted for on a straight line basis over the lease term of an ongoing lease. The aggregate cost of incentives provided to the lessee is recognised as reduction of rental income over the lease term on a straight line basis.

4.15 Government grants

Government grants are recognised in the financial statements when there is reasonable assurance that:

- (a) The Group would comply with the conditions attached to the grant; and
- (b) The grants would be received.

Government grants relating to costs are deferred and recognised as income in profit or loss on a straight line basis over the periods necessary to match them with the related costs that they are intended to compensate.

Government grants related to assets are deducted from the carrying amount of the assets. (Government grants related to assets are presented in the statement of financial position as deferred revenue and recognised in profit or loss on a systematic basis over the useful life of the asset.)

6. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING ESTIMATES AND JUDGEMENTS

6.1 Changes in estimate

Estimates are continually evaluated and are based on historical experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

The Trustees are of the opinion that there are no significant changes in estimates at the end of the reporting period.

6.2 Critical judgements made in applying accounting policies

The following are judgements made by management in the process of applying the accounting policies of the Group that have the most significant effect on the amounts recognised in the financial statements.

- (a) Classification between investment properties and property, plant and equipment and prepaid lease payment for land

The Group has developed certain criteria based on FRS 140 in making judgement whether a property qualifies as an investment property. Investment property is a property held to earn rentals or for capital appreciation or both.

Some properties comprise a portion that is held to earn rentals or for capital appreciation and another portion that is held for use in the supply of goods or services or for administrative purposes. If these portions could be sold separately (or leased out separately under a finance lease), the Group would account for the portions separately. If the portions could not be sold separately, the property is an investment property only if an insignificant portion is held for use in the production or supply of goods or services or for administrative purposes. Judgement is made on an individual property basis to determine whether ancillary services are so significant that a property does not qualify as investment property.

6.3 Key sources of estimation uncertainty

The following are key assumptions concerning the future and other key sources of estimation uncertainty at the end of each reporting period that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year.

- (a) Depreciation of plant and machinery

The cost of plant and machinery is depreciated on a straight-line basis over the assets' useful lives. The principal depreciation periods and rates are as follows:

Building	2% - 10%
Lift	10%
Motor vehicle	20% - 25%
Furniture, fixtures and fittings	10% - 25%
Office renovation	10% - 25%
Leasehold land	over 99 years

- (b) Impairment of receivables

The Group makes impairment of receivables based on an assessment of the recoverability of receivables. Impairment is applied to receivables where events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying amounts may not be recoverable. Management specifically analyses historical bad debt, customer concentration, customer creditworthiness, current economic trends and changes in customer payment terms when making a judgement to evaluate the adequacy of impairment of receivables. Where expectations differ from the original estimates, the differences would impact the carrying amount of receivables.

(c) Fair value measurement

The financial and non-financial assets and liabilities that are measured subsequent to initial recognition at fair value are grouped into Level 1 to Level 3 based on the degree to which the fair value inputs are observable.

- (i) Level 1 fair value measurements are those derived from quoted prices (unadjusted) in active markets for identical assets or liabilities;
- (ii) Level 2 fair value measurements are those derived from inputs other than quoted prices included within Level 1 that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly (i.e. as prices) or indirectly (i.e. derived from prices); and
- (iii) Level 3 fair value measurements are those derived from inputs for the asset or liability that are not based on observable market data (unobservable inputs).

The classification of an item into the above levels is based on the lowest level of the inputs used in the fair value measurement of the item. Transfers of items between levels are recognised in the period they occur.

26. FINANCIAL RISK MANAGEMENT OBJECTIVES AND POLICIES

The financial risk management objective of the Group is to optimise value creation for shareholders whilst minimising the potential adverse impact arising from fluctuations in foreign currency exchange and interest rates and the unpredictability of the financial markets.

The Group operates within an established risk management framework and clearly defined guidelines that are regularly reviewed by the Board of Trustees and does not trade in derivative financial instruments. Financial risk management is carried out through risk review programmes, internal control systems, insurance programmes and adherence to the Group financial risk management policies. The Group is exposed mainly to credit risk, liquidity and cash flow risk, interest rate risk, foreign currency risk and market risk. Information on the management of the related exposures is detailed below.

(a) Credit risk

The exposure of the Group to credit risk arises primarily from trade and other receivables. For the other financial assets (including cash and bank balances), the Group minimises credit risk by dealing exclusively with high credit rating counterparties.

It is the Group's policy to monitor the financial standing of these counter parties on an ongoing basis to ensure that the Group is exposed to minimal credit risk.

At the date of the report, the Group's and the Foundation's exposure to credit risk that is primarily represented by the carrying value of each class of financial assets is recognised in the statement of financial position.

At the date of the report, there were no significant trade and other receivables to the Group and the Foundation.

In respect of cash and bank balances placed with licensed banks in Malaysia, the Trustees believe that the possibility of non-performance by these financial institutions is remote on the basis of their financial strength.

(b) Liquidity and cash flow risk

The Group actively manages its operating cash flows and the availability of funding so as to ensure that all operating, investing and financing needs are met. In executing its liquidity risk management strategy, the Group measures and forecasts its cash commitments and maintains a level of bank balance deemed adequate to finance the activities of the Group.

The table below summarises the maturity profile of the liabilities of the Group and of the Foundation at the end of each reporting period based on contractual undiscounted repayment obligations.

- a) Summit Streams Sdn. Bhd. (SSSB) vs Yayasan Selangor (YS) and SAP Ulu Yam Sdn. Bhd. (SAP) – Summon No. 22NCVC-544-11/2014 at High Court Shah Alam

SSSB has entered into a sale and purchase agreement with SAP in relation to property held under HS (D) 4104 PT No. 2731 Mukim Ulu Yam, Daerah Hulu Selangor. YS has authorised SAP as its representative to manage the affairs of the property based on the Power Attorney given by YS to SAP

SSSB has been informed by the District Town Planning Division Hulu Selangor that the status of the property has been changed from building to forest. Due to that matter, SAP through its solicitors has recommended to SSSB to terminate the sale and purchase agreement and return the deposit payment including interest. However, SAP failed to return the deposit and has suggested that the agreement to be renewed in which SSSB is required to responsible in applying of land status. By renewal of the agreement, SSSB has failed to settle the balance of the purchase price and has caused SAP to terminate the agreement.

The SSSB by writ of summons demanded the Specific Performance of the Sale and Purchase Agreement dated 31.7.2009, an order that the defendants execute the Sale and Purchase Agreement and damages amounting to RM357,000,000.

The court set aside the writ of summons and statement of claim filed by the plaintiff on 2014 as the plaintiff was wound up and failed to obtain permission from the Insolvency Department to proceed with the action. However, on 2017, the Plaintiff filed again the writ of summons and statement of claim towards SAP and YS but then withdraw the case as SAP has been wound up. Then, in the year 2019, the plaintiff re-file again the summons only against YS as the Defendant of the case.

In relation to that, YS had filed the striking out application against the summons based on argument that the claim made by SAP was (“obviously unsustainable”). However, the High Court on 13th Mac 2019, disallowed the striking out application and ordered for the case to be trialed. YS then, filed an appeal for the decision made by the High Court Judge, but the Court of Appeal had dismissed the appeal on 22nd of September 2020. Therefore, YS need to pay costs of RM20,000.00 to SAP as action cost and the trial at High Court will be continued. The High Court trial had been held on 05th of October 2020 and it will be continued on 02nd and 03rd of Jun 2021

- b) Aviation Development Corporation (M) Sdn Bhd vs Yayasan Selangor (YS) – Saman No. 22NCVC-791-07/2012 at High Court Kuala Lumpur

YS and ADC entered a joint venture agreement for the purpose of jointly developing an airpark on Yayasan Selangor’s land in Ulu Bernam, Ulu Selangor. Pursuant to the agreement, the YS allowed ADC to take vacant possession of the land on 16th January 2007, causing ADC to commence with the development of an airpark equipped with an airstrip as well as infrastructure and facilities required to park, maintain and operate general aviation aircraft. It was also agreed that the YS shall transfer the land to the ADC for the sum RM1.8 million. ADC has already paid the sum of RM507,053.00 and there was outstanding balance of RM1,292,947.00 which was to be paid for the transfer of the land within stipulated period.

On 4th July 2012, YS has filed the Writ of Summons, Statement of claim dated 3rd July 2012 for the declaration that the ADC has breached its obligations under the Joint Venture Agreement dated 8th August 2007 and the JV Agreement should be terminated. The declaration of Power of Attorney dated 8th August 2007 is void and its revocation is registered at the High Court Registrar office.

- b) Aviation Development Corporation (M) Sdn Bhd vs Yayasan Selangor (YS) – Saman No. 22NCVC-791-07/2012 at High Court Kuala Lumpur (continued)

On 04 December 2013, The High Court has made decision to rescind the JV Agreement dated 08 August 2007 based on clause 4.7 of the JV Agreement. YS need to refund to ADC an amount RM507,053.00 as deposit payment, squatters compensation and other related payments. In relation to that, YS need to pay all the development costs that has been spend for any commercial activities undertaken by ADC for the development from the date of the Joint Venture agreement until vacant possession is given back to YS. The High Court ordered YS to pay the sum of RM24,202,141.00 to ADC in respect of the assesement of damages.

On 18 April 2017, YS has been ordered by the High Court to pay RM24,202,141 to ADC in relation to a civil dispute over the cancellation of a joint venture agreement within 21 days. Aggrieved with the High Court decision, YS filed the appeal and The court of Appeal on 12/07/2020 has made decision to allow the appeal by YS and dismiss the ADC cross appeal. The decision of the High Court was plainly wrong and therefore, the order of the High Court dated 14/07/2017 is accordingly set aside. ADC need to pay costs of RM30,000.00 to YS as action cost and below subject to allocator.

ADC filed Federal Court Leave Application arising from Court of Appeal againts YS. On 28/09/2020, the Federal allowed the application and ADC need to file the appeal notice to the Federal Court within 14 days from the date of the judgment. The Federal Court had set the trial to be held on 05th of May 2021.

- c) Yayasan Selangor (YS) vs IDE Mobile – Saman No. WA-A52NCVC-363-04/2020 at High Court Kuala Lumpur

YS has given an offer to rent a display space of `Light Emitting Diode (LED) `ads panel at the Selangor Foundation Building Jalan Bukit Bintang, Kuala Lumpur (" YS Bukit Bintang Building ") toward IDE MOBILE on 2nd February 2017 through an offer letter.

On 19th March 2019, YS issued a Remedy Notice to IDE MOBILE for breach of the terms, among others, IDE Mobile failed, refused or neglected to settle the payment of three (3) months of rent and other payments, which are due and accrued as of 19th March 2019 amount of RM 302,100.00. IDE Mobile has submitted a request letter dated 28th March 2019 to YS to reconsider the payment of the amount due and accrued as IDE Mobile is allegedly still in the process of obtaining approval from the local authority on the advertising license to use the LED.

Subsequently, on 11th April 2019, YS issued a letter to IDE Mobile to reschedule the payment of the amount due and accrued RM 333,900 within 5 month starting from April 2019 to August 2019 with a new monthly payment of RM 95,400 per month. However, IDE Mobile has made a counter proposal to pay the amount due to YS within 8 month starting from May 2019 until December 2019 with monthly payment of RM 47,700 per month. YS has accept the proposal from IDE Mobile.

Despite of rescheduling the payment of IDE Mobile, no payment has been made by IDE Mobile to YS pursuant to such arrangement. Three (3) months later, the IDE Mobile has issued a letter to YS and suggested that the outstanding and accrued amount be rescheduled, and the payment period extended until April 2020.

YS issued a letter of acceptance on 17th August 2019 to IDE Mobile regarding the new reschedule payment by IDE Mobile and YS have received the payment for May, June and July 2019 from IDE Mobile.

- c) Yayasan Selangor (YS) vs IDE Mobile – Saman No. WA-A52NCVC-363-04/2020 at High Court Kuala Lumpur (continued)

On 14th September 2019, YS has issued a Notice of Termination to the Defendant, requesting IDE Mobile to settle the outstanding and accrued rent payment in the total amount of RM 318,000.00 within 30 days, and also to surrender vacant possession to YS on or before 15th October 2019. YS then filed Writ of Summon and Statement of claim againsts IDE and demanded the damages amount to RM505,630.85 to be paid for the loss occurred.

Further from the filing of the Summons and Statement of Claim from YS against IDE Mobile, they have made a counterclaim against YS where the total claim is RM19,444,635.20 (Excluding other amounts). Accordingly, due to the amount of the counterclaim in excess of RM1 Million, then on 15/08/2020, the Sessions Court Judge has informed that the entire case has been transferred to the High Court because the total claim is within the jurisdiction of the High Court. Therefore, The High Court had set the trial to be held on 01st of Jun 2021.

28. SIGNIFICANT EVENTS

On 16 March 2020, Malaysia Government announced the imposition of Movement Control Order (“MCO”) nationwide to curb the spread of the COVID-19 infection in Malaysia pursuant to the Prevention and Control of Infectious Diseases Act 1988 and the Police Act 1987.

Before this financial statement were made out, the Board of Directors has considered the nature of the impact from an outbreak of COVID-19 in Malaysia, that may impact the financial position, performance and the cash flow of the Company ended on the reporting date thereon;

The Management concludes that the impact of non-adjusting events from the outbreak of COVID-19 is not significantly affecting the fair value of the financial assets and non-financial assets of the Company, including the classification of current and non-current items that presenting on the reporting date.

Given on the current economic circumstances, it is difficult for the Management to estimate the possible financial performance and its cash flow of the Company for the period ending on the next 12 months from the date of this report. However, the Management do indicates their intention to continue in operation and their continuing financial support to the Company to meet the payment obligation for the debts that fall due within the next twelve months from the date of this report.
